
#### Public Health Is Theme Of Talk At Shaw University

#### Eisenhower Heads United Defense Fund As Organization's Honorary Chairman

NEW YORK — President Eisenhower has accepted the honorary chairmanship of the United Defense Fund which will seek \$20,225,000 through Community Chest and other united community campaigns this year for support of the defense-related programs of its six member agencies. It has been announced by Edward L. Ryerson of Chicago, chairman of the UDF board.

Pledging his whole-hearted support to the United Defense Fund program, and characterizing it as "a cause in which I am proud to serve," Mr. Eisenhower declared that if there's an armistice in Korea, "there will still be equal need for services USO and the other UDF agencies are providing, possibly in a way a greater need."

In view of the President's definition of continuing needs, the UDF board of directors has adopted the 1954 budget of \$20,225,000 to continue defense-related services at home and overseas.

The interest of the Department of Defense in the program of the United Defense Fund has been indicated by Dr. John A. Hannah, Assistant Secretary of Defense. "The health and morale of military personnel during off-duty hours, and of men and women in defense industries are

matters of major concern to the Defense Department," he says, adding that the Department "appreciates the generous support it has always had from volunteer civilian agencies and welcomes the evidence that such support will be continued."

The unstinted support of labor in United Defense Fund activities has also been pledged by Walter Reuther, president of CIO and George Meany, president of AFL.

"The United Defense Fund is a force for good in America," Mr. Reuther said. "It is a manifestation of the people's desire to improve their life and to build community responsibility. We of the CIO are proud to play our part in this crusade for human decency."

Mr. Meany points out that in merging defense-related services into one organization, the United Defense Fund has employed the technique of federation which the American Federation of Labor, through its own experience, has found to be a source of strength.

The United Defense Fund includes USO, United Community Defense Services, American Refugee for Korea, American Social Hygiene Association, United Seamen's Service, and National Education Association.


