SHAW FINALISTS — Baccalaureate services Sunday afternoon, May 10, at 2:30 o'clock in University Church will formally open the 35th Commencement season at Shaw University. The annual sermon will be delivered by the Reverend William L. Parker, Minister, The United Church, Raleigh. Commencement exercises will be held in Raleigh Memorial Auditorium Monday afternoon, June 1, at 2:30 o'clock when the annual address will be delivered by Congressman Adam Clayton Powell, Jr., Minister, Abyssinian Baptist Church, New York, N. Y. Dr. William R. Strasser, President of Shaw University, will preside at Commencement commencement ceremonies. One hundred and five students are candidates for degrees; however final certification of graduates is yet to be made by University officials.

First Fine Arts Fete At Shaw Univ. May 11-17

RALEIGH — During the week of May 11-17, Shaw University School of Fine Arts will hold a Fine Arts Fete. At 2 o'clock on Monday night, May 11, the festival will be inaugurated with an exhibition of paintings in the art gallery on the West campus. Two members of the Shaw faculty will serve as curators. Leroy Holmes of the Art Collection, Greensboro, will inaugurate the festival on May 11. There will be a musical dance hour by Greenleaf and the Shaw faculty. The event is under the direction of Elva J. Reeves of Shaw University.

The outlook for the rest of 1953, according to the USDA, points to little change in the overall economic situation of farmers. 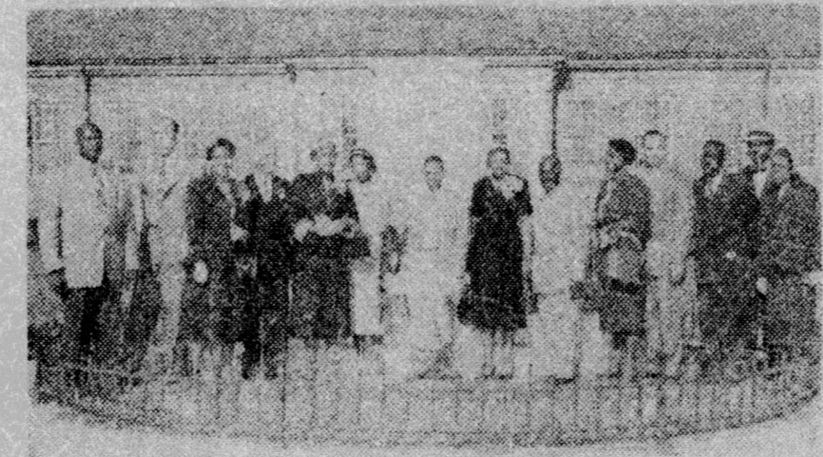

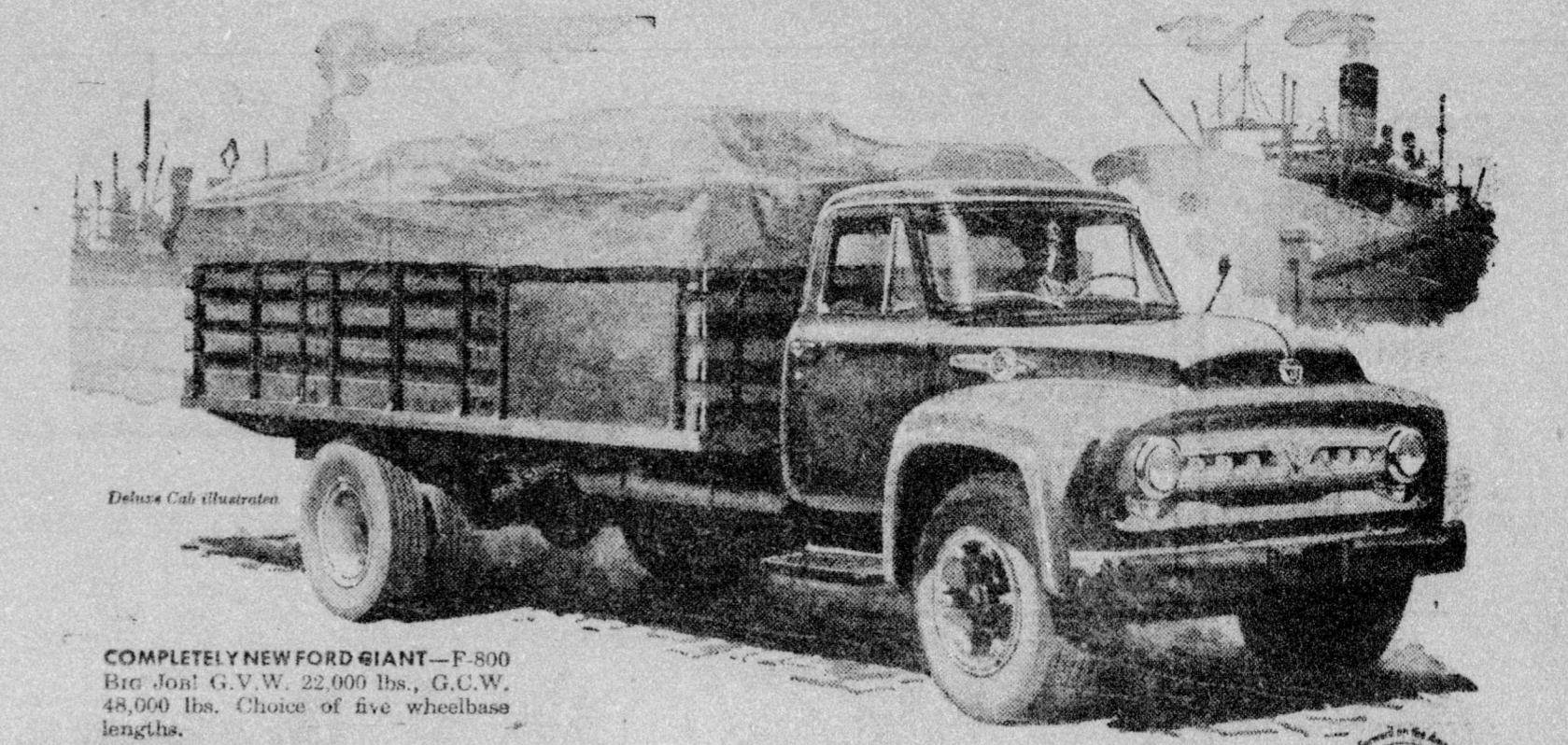
