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Lafayette Miller Pays N.C.'s Supreme Penalty

RALFIGH — Lafayette Miller is Miller denied killing Boyd however and steadfastly continued to deny this throughout his trial and also during his tenure in Central Prison. Both the State Supreme Court and the U. S. Supreme Court upheld his conviction. Governor William B. Umstead also refused to alter the death sentence, thus dooming Lafayette Miller to die.

Boyd was shot through the window of his home on Thanksgiving Eve, 1951. Lafayette Miller was picked up by highway patrolmen shortly after the killing driving Boyd's car. Mrs. Boyd was found locked in the trunk of the car.

Miller was led into the gas chamber at 10:02 a.m. Friday. He was seated in the big oaken chair before the prison guards. His chest was bound with leather straps as were his wrists and ankles. Standing a few feet away reading the

scripture was the prison Chaplain. Shortly, the chamber was empty except for Miller. After an electric

shock was heard, gray colored cyanide gas rose from beneath the gurney chair. Miller struggled only briefly. In ten minutes he was dead.

Lafayette Miller had spent most

of his life in prison. His life of crime began in 1937 with an auto

theft. In 1944, Miller was sentenced to 12-15 years for second

degree burglary. He was released in 1950. Miller, 21, was a native

of Greene County.
