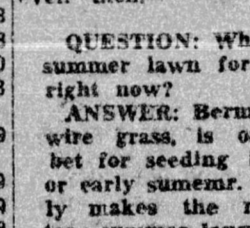

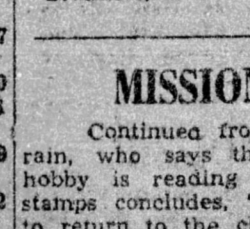
The hot dry summer weather is with us again and I wish to emphasize the fact that plenty of water is essential to good quality in vegetables, especially the fast-growing leafy crops. If they lack sufficient water for just a few days they will become stunted, fibrous and tough. During hot weather vegetables require about one inch of water per week, whether it is supplied artificially or by rain. Of course they will survive without that much water but they will be of much lower quality because of the stunted growth.



QUESTION: Can I transplant a small apple tree this summer? ANSWER: It can be done, but cold weather. If you must transplant it now, you will have to dig a ball of dirt with the roots, being careful not to disturb too many of them. Hot weather transplanting also requires constant care. The plan should be mulched and kept well watered. It may not live even then.



QUESTION: What is the best summer lawn for me to seed right now? ANSWER: Bermuda grass or wire grass, is often the best bet for seeding in late spring or early summer. It is definite-ly makes the most satisfactory summer lawn in the Piedmont and Coastal Plains. Carpet grass, a low creeping variety with wide, green leaves, does well in parts of Eastern North Carolina and the Piedmont, but in the Western part of the State it often "freezes out." Seed are not generally available, however.
