NAACP Alters Separate, But Equal Stand; Wants Full Integration Now

ST. LOUIS — Walter White of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People

... said that the association had abandoned its separate but equal theory and will fight henceforth for total integration of the Negro in American life. White made the statement at a press conference prior to the opening of the organization's 44th annual convention which opened here Tuesday, June 23.

"The myth of white supremacy is crumbling but has not been crushed," said Mr. White.

"Unless America can show its good faith toward the Negro, the country stands to lose support from the dark-skinned countries of the world," he said. These people are skeptical because of what they have heard about the treatment of Negroes.

"There are 2,000 Negroes enrolled in universities in nine Southern states and litigation over admission of Negroes pending in five other states, White said, indicating that the association will try to increase materially the number of Negro voters in the 17 Northern and border states.

800 delegates are on hand at the six-day convention.

State NAACP Again Cited For Its Role In Fight For Rights Of Negroes

RALEIGH — The North Carolina Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has again been named winner of the Thalhimer Award for outstanding achievements in the field of civil rights during 1952.

Kelly Alexander of Charlotte, State NAACP president, was notified of the award last week. The presentation will be made at the annual convention being held in St. Louis, Mo., this week.

This is the second time that the

North Carolina Chapter has won this award. Last year it received the special Thalhimer citation. The cash value of the award is one hundred dollars.

The State group was cited for its part in helping free Max Ingram on the celebrated charge of "passing out" and for pushing the prosecution and for pushing a Negro woman the paratrooper were white—MRS. M. P. CALDWELL.

N. C. Man Given 'Life' For Role In Robbery-Murder

Woman Was Victim Of Six Robbers

To Spend Life In West Va. Prison

MARTINSVILLE, Va. (Special) — A North Carolina man has been sentenced to spend the rest of his natural life in West Virginia State Prison for the role he played in the robbery-murder of a "wealthy" woman at Logan, West Virginia last April 29.

Young Girls Are Victims Of Maniacs In Two Cities

Second Wake White Man Is Accused

Victim Seven Years Of Age, Recalling Recent Rape Case

RALEIGH — For the second time in less than two months, a white person has been haled into court in Wake County on charges of making sexual attacks upon young colored girls.

In both cases, both young victims have been seven years of age. In the first instance, a 15-year-old white farm boy was sentenced to serve a life imprisonment term for rape. In the latter instance, which arose last week, a 35-year-old Cary man who admits that he is a "sex maniac" faces moral charges.

Free under a \$2,500 bond pending a preliminary hearing Monday is W. A. Hughes of Cary, Route 1. He will be tried before Magistrate H. A. Bland.

Church Bias Dies In N. C., 'Unmourned'

RALEIGH — There was neither weeping, wailing nor gnashing of the teeth in Catholic churches of North Carolina last Sunday as the requiem mass for racially segregating congregations was read.

Neither was there rejoicing when bias before the altar had at last "crossed the bar."

Rather, there was indication throughout the Raleigh diocese (which includes all of North Carolina with the exception of Gaston County) that the state's Catholics are ready to accept the directive of their titular head, the Most Reverend Vincent Waters, Bishop of Raleigh to again become a single body.

Man Caught Attacking Victim, 8

Caught In Act Of Attacking Girl In Winston-Salem

WINSTON-SALEM — (Special) — A 28-year-old man termed a "sex maniac" was apprehended here this week in the act of committing criminal assault upon an eight-year-old girl. The man and his youthful victim were discovered by law enforcement officers after screams led them into a thicket not too far removed from a busy thoroughfare.

According to reports made by investigating officers, a path of discarded men's clothing and the screams of the victim led them to a spot in a thicket some 100 feet removed from a railroad track where they found Robert Nathaniel Young, 28, naked except for his shoes, engaged in criminal relations with the small child on Monday morning.

Patrolmen T. J. Reavis, Jr. and Charlie Harris arrived on the scene at approximately 10:15 a. m. and arrested the man identified as Young, of 1023 East First Street.

PASTOR GRANTED PRISON PAROLE

GREENSBORO — In Greensboro recently, the Mount Zion Church, was the scene of rejoicing at it learned that one of its members was being paroled from prison.

William H. Hall, 56, was sentenced in Guilford a year ago to 3 1/2 years for embezzlement. His friends and church members, however, never let Hall's court record shake their faith in him.

Throughout the Greensboro proceedings, deacons and other Church officials clamored to have Hall released. The State Parole Commission announced on Tuesday that he had finally been released.

According to the parole notice, "The parolee will live with his family in Greensboro and be employed as pastor of The Mount Zion Church."
