

"Does the dream of equality live in your heart? Then listen!

When America was an unimportant strip of colonial coast, the struggle for independence fired the hopes of oppressed peoples in the world because human rights were being defined in inspiring words.

All men, we said, are created equal. We shall render equal and exact justice to all, regardless of condition. Men died to uphold this pledge, yet many have also died in the intervening generations because realization of these promises was

education . . . and enter professional schools. They are your benefits, and your children's!

Many more are yet to be won through the dogged determination of the N.A.A.C.P. Legal Defense and Educational Fund, headed by Thurgood Marshall. There is but one barrier . . . money! This organization-which operates without profit to its members-is desperately in need of your contribution to carry on its vital work.
