RALEIGH — It is hoped locally that a sufficient number of Negro men will qualify for the position of fireman during the next few weeks to man the Auditorium Fire Station.

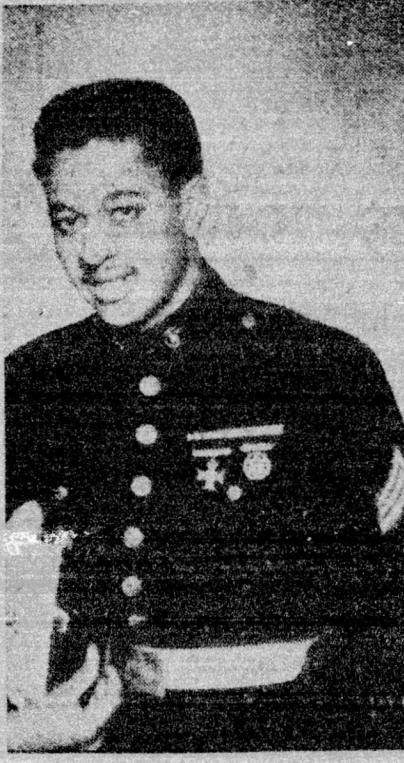
