All-Negro-Staffed Station Seen For Auditorium Site

PALEIGH --- It is hoped locally that a sufficient number of Nogro men will qualify for the position of firemen during the next weeks to man the Auditoriim Fire Station.

According to a promise given the Rateigh Citizens Association last year, Negro firemen will be used exclusively at the fire station located in the rear of the City Auditorium when the new station now under construction on South Dawson Street is completed.

It is not believed that any local Segroes have taken the Civil Ser vice examination for firemen du to the fact that here-to-fore Ne gores have been excluded from that asociation that jobs in the Fire Department be opened to Neuroes qualified the assurance as given that such a course would te taken in the very mear future In keeping with this assurance expected that now the only remaining obstacle to this employ cent will be the securing of a suf-



traffic law violators are required to atjend the school conducted by the State Highway Patrol. At the final class registrants have to take a written examination. Those who successfully bass the exam are awarded certificates by the Highway Patrol

and their grades become a permanent part of their drivers license file maintained by the State Department of Motor Vehicles. About 100 attended the three phased school. Tentative plans call for the establishment of similar schools throughout the state.
