Governor Names Dr. F. L. Atkins

WSTC PREXY

RALEIGH — Dr. Francis L. Atkins, president of Winston-Salem Teachers' College, has been appointed as the lone Negro member of Governor William B. Umstead's "Higher Education Commission".

The appointment is the first significant one for a Negro to the governor's date.

Findings of the commission may greatly affect the present educational pattern in the state for Negroes and Indians.

The commission has been charged with studying the whole question of state-supported educational institutions above high school level and to study their inter-related activities.

At stake in the commission's findings are the status of the present Consolidated Greater University of North Carolina and the decentralized Negro state supported teachers colleges at Fayetteville and Elizabeth City as well as the Agricultural and Technical College at Greensboro and the North Carolina College at Durham.

Also involved is the Pembroke College for Indians. The questions of what to do with these various institutions is expected to occupy the commission for some time. However, a preliminary report is expected to be made in a reasonably short time.

It was not immediately apparent that the expected ruling of the Supreme Court in the Clarendon in the South's elementary schools County Case affecting segregation had any effect upon the governor's decision to appoint the study.

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2 DIE IN HIWAY CRASH

RACE LAWYERS APPEAL TO SCHOOL BOARD

DURHAM (Special) — Lawyers are threatening more action against Durham City School Board unless the board acts to remedy some of the points at which discrimination was proven against Negro schools in federal court here three years ago.

In a case that attracted national attention in July 1950, Durham's Negro citizens won a race in Federal Judge Johnson J. Hayes' court that found discrimination existing between this city's white and Negro schools.

Plaintiffs in the case were Carolyn J. Blue and George B. other Negro parents and 72 children.

Stipends of the court's attorney to the school board were the plaintiffs' lawyers M. Hugh Thompson and John H. Wheeler of Durham, and Oliver Hill, Meritt A. Martin and Spaulding Robinson of Richmond, Va.

Parents in Durham pointed out the suit was filed on the eve of the recent \$50 million bond election. However, a special court suit there was not related to the election. The fact the suit was filed and the necessity of the bond election.

Pointing out the suit was backed by the Durham Committee on Negro Affairs, the spokesman said. The Durham Committee on Negro Affairs supported the recent bond issue for a bond and would be a school. One interest in the Durham School suit is in having the City of Durham live up to its judges.
