Murders Send 2 Brothers And Dad-In-Law To Jail

CLINTON — Murder became a family affair with two brothers in Clinton, and a mother-in-law recently.

In Clinton last Friday two brothers, John Hobbs, 21, and Clyde Hobbs, 17, were held without bond on a murder charge growing out of the death of their older brother, Joe Hobbs, 27.

In Burlington, Joseph Bruce was sentenced to life imprisonment in the state penitentiary for the fatal wounding of his son-in-law, James Alford. Bruce was convicted of killing Alford with a shotgun after an argument.

Magistrate Peetey Bradshaw of Clinton found sufficient evidence against the young Hobbs brothers to hold them for the murder.


World Topic Basic Theme For College


