James Parker, 36, of near Salem, is dead and his 26-year-old brother, Alton, is in a critical condition at Duke Hospital.

A Clinton Justice of the Peace gave Williams a preliminary hearing and released him under a bond of \$2,500.

### Senate Probe Committee Charge N. C. War Clerk

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Senator Joseph R. McCarthy red hunting Wisconsin law maker, reached out here Wednesday and brought Mrs. Anne Lee Moss, Durham, North Carolina, operator in the signal corps message center, before his committee and labeled her as a former card-carrying Communist member.

The senator charged her as one of the persons working in Secretary Stevens war department as being a Russian agent, in charge of high secrets. This evidence was brought out when Mrs. Moss, 37, was called before McCarthy's subcommittee.

Named Mrs. Annie Lee Moss, 37, as a member of the Communist party in the northeast club of Washington in 1945. According to chief committee counsel Roy M. Cohn, her testimony has been supported by FBI reports in the period from 1945 to 1949.

Mrs. Moss received her army appointment as a teleprinter operator (semi-automatic) salary, \$3,175 a year with the following duties:

Receiving messages over radio or wire circuits from stations all over the world; examines messages received in tape form in code and plain text. Messages received in code must be carefully scrutinized inasmuch as it is more difficult to detect omissions or errors in coded letter or number groups.

As work load requires, ascertains and records final disposition on messages addressed to this station and originating overseas or by state department army security agency, central intelligence agency, general staff, etc. transmitting messages over radio or wire circuits to stations all over the world.

Mrs. Moss had been subpoenaed to appear but her attorney supplied a certificate attesting she was too ill to be present. Located at home, she told reports she had been a member of the Communist party for many years.

Mrs. Moss also said she had appeared Monday in executive session before the house committee on un-American activities and had denied Communist connections until.

### Mystery Still Shrouds Goldsboro Explosion

GOLDSBORO — Local police and the State Bureau of Investigation were just as baffled Wednesday as they were Friday morning when the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Merriweather was almost destroyed by a blast.

Investigating officers told the CAROLINIAN representative that certain physical specimens had been taken from the premises and sent to a laboratory, where technicians would analyze them and make an authentic finding. They admitted that there was very little they could do until the report was forthcoming.

Local citizens and even the victims were unable to shed any light on the unfortunate happening. The family of five, Ernestine 12, Samuel 10, Edward 7, and the parents, were awakened by a blast on Friday morning, 1:15. That virtually tore the back of the house away.

The family is said to have been unusually lucky that none of them suffered any injury.

TABLED IN FATAL SHOOTING  
WILLIAMSON — Augustus Hanger, 33-year-old local resident, was fatally stabbed at his rooming house here last Saturday night by James R. Lee, police reported. Subbed in the chest and back, Hanger died in the street as he was being removed to a hospital. Hanger was arrested by police at his home in the early morning hours. He was jailed without bond. According to investigating officials, the two men had been arguing the night before the killing and Hanger is alleged to

have cut Hanger without warning as he sat at his table eating.

BOY 13, ARRESTED AT STEEL WILSON — A 13-year-old Nash County boy was arrested at a steel mill in Nash County last Saturday. He was assisting two men at the process of making liquor. Elton E. Easton and Isaac Wooten, 22 and 21, respectively, by the manufacturing of a large quantity of moonshine. The youth was carrying several half-gallons of fruit jars to the still when arrested. Officers seized the 100-

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
