Counting on soybean bacteria left over in the soil by the previous crop can be costly, farmers' ex-perience shows. Experiment station studies prove that soybean bacteris are easily killed by drouth, wet spells, sour soil, and many other things. Too, leftover ris may lose their power to benefit the next crop.

Illinois farmers ran tests on this last year. They planted some in-oculated soybeans, and some without inoculation, on old soybean land. Freshly inoculating the seed paid a net profit of up to \$11.51 an acre, even though soybeans had been raised on the same land be-

i It takes only a couple of min-utes and about a dime's worth of material to inoculate soybeans for an acre, so a yield increase of only 8 pounds per acre more than paya. Fresh inoculation often increases yields several bushels per acre, even when soybeans were grown even when soybeans were grows on the same field recently.
