

NCAW Prexy To Be Mother's Day Keynote At A & T

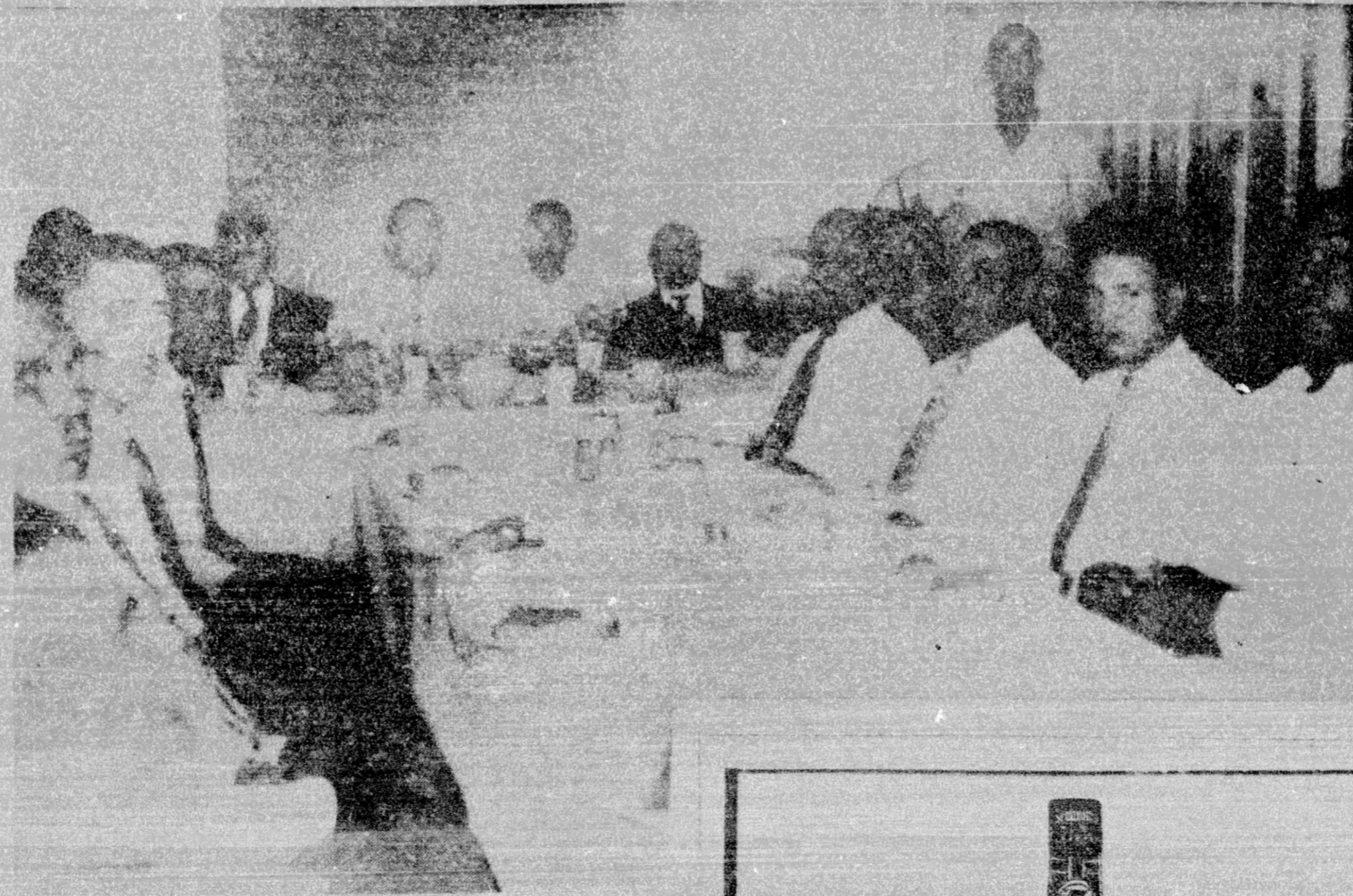
Mrs. Vivian Mason Slated At Sun. Morning Services

Mrs. Vivian Mason, president of the National Council of Negro Women, will be the keynote speaker at the annual Mother's Day observance scheduled at A & T College on Sunday, May 9.

The prominent civic worker, elected to her present position in 1953, has had a varied and interesting career. A professional social worker for more than 25 years, Mrs. Mason served as secretary to Y.W.C.A. organizations in Baltimore, Brooklyn and Norfolk. She entered social service work in New York City and was elevated to the high post of director of the Division of Social Services in New York in 1949. Returning to Norfolk, she continued her active interest in civic and social service matters.

She will speak at the morning worship services, scheduled for 11:00 A. M. in the college's Harrison Auditorium, which will officially set off a series of activities honoring the mothers of A & T College students.

The plan of inviting the parents to the campus began five years ago, has grown steadily. Last year more than 900 parents participated in the event.

Lynchburg Awaits Court Decision

LYNCHBURG, Va. — (ANP) — The proposed \$1,500,000 Dunbar High School for Negroes in this hill city will not be erected until the U. S. Supreme Court has handed down its ruling on segregation. It was decided here last week by the city council.

Plans for the construction of the school, which has been under development for several years, were halted last week as school board members handed the proposal to the city council with the advice that no action be taken until the high court renders its decision on the controversial segregation issue.
