J. H. BROWN WINS AWARD TO ATTEND YALE

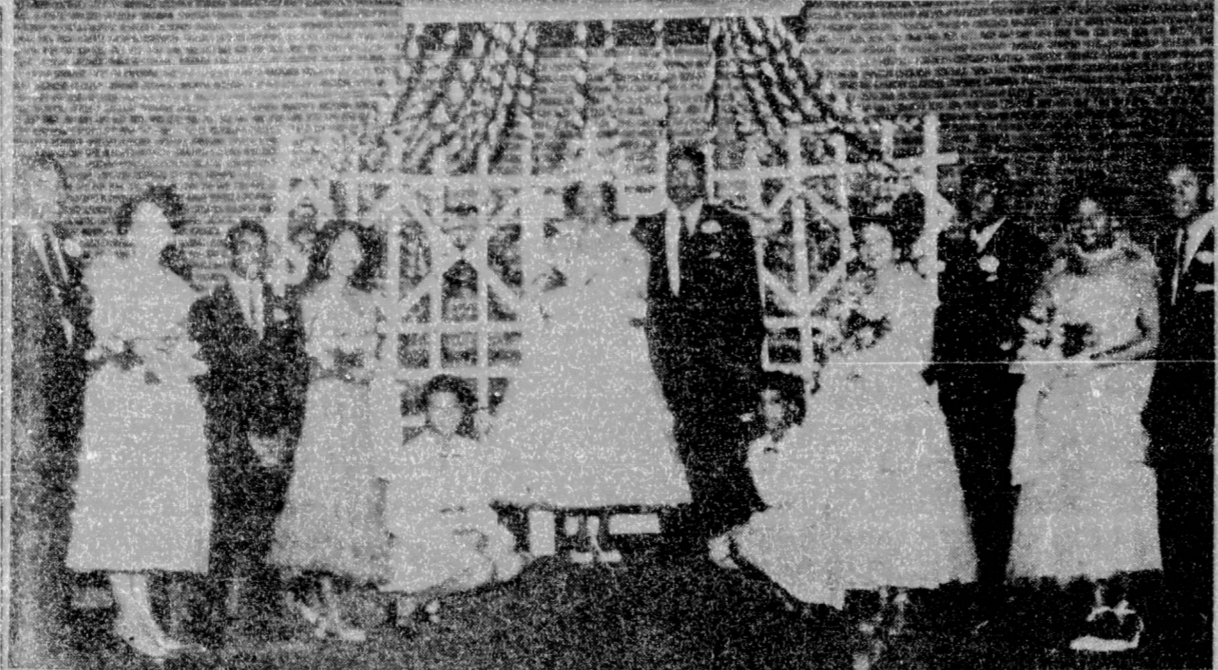

Dean Brown is a graduate of St. Augustine's College and attended Shaw University Summer School and received the M. A. degree at Columbia University.

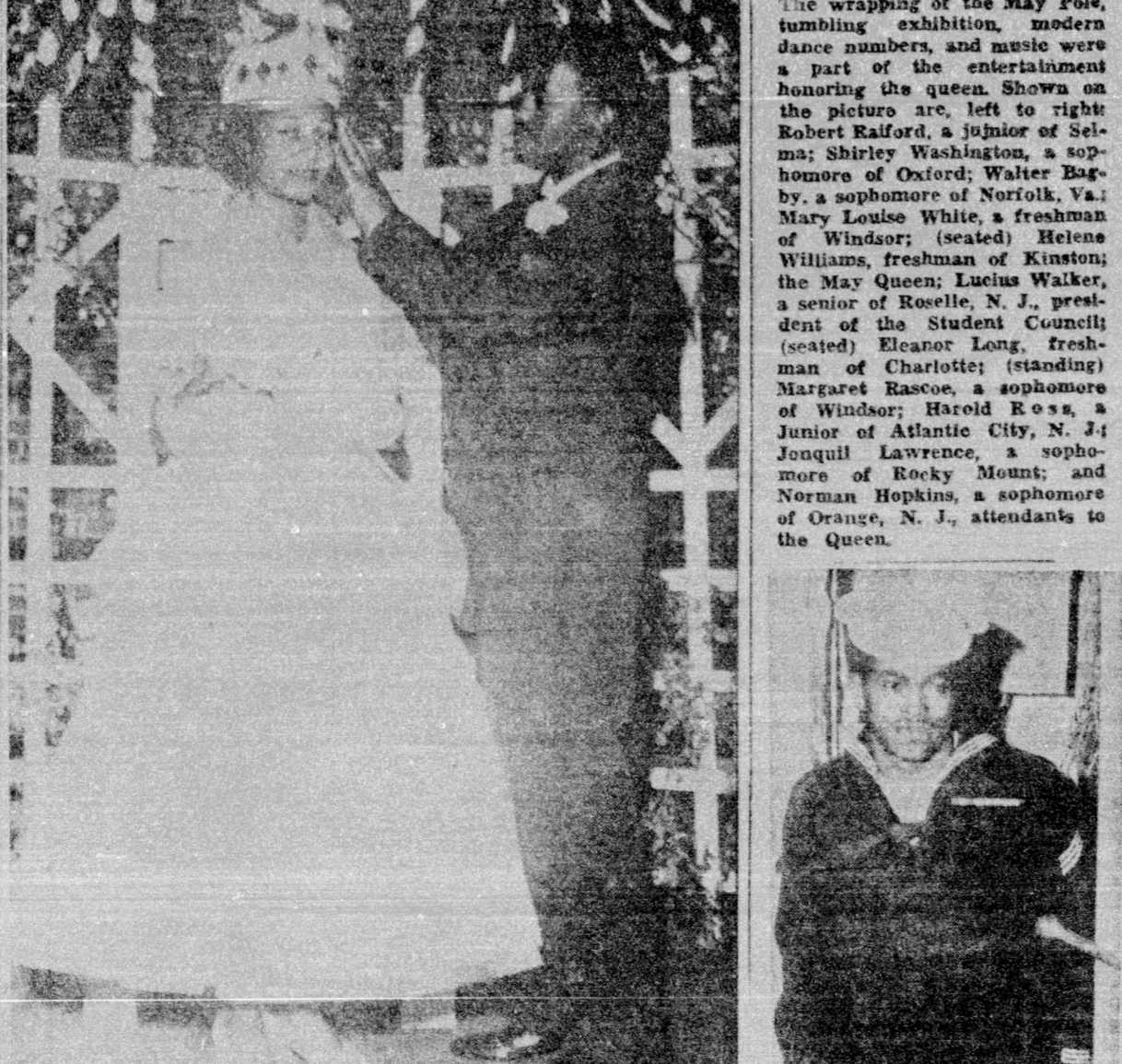

White Baptist Church Opens To Negroes

OAK GROVE, Ark.—(AP)—The membership of a small white country church in this town community was thrown open to Negroes of the Baptist denomination last week. The church is the Oak Grove Baptist church, pastored by Rev. A. C. Keith, a former army chaplain and currently administrator of Southern Baptist college.

Rev. Ruffolo with the enthusiastic approval of the congregation, invited a Negro minister to conduct community revival services and to baptize four of 10 new Negro members who joined the church last week. This was the first revival conducted for Negroes of any denomination in this area in 35 years.

Said one church member, "the members took the position that if we could not do something like this here, we'd look funny talking about foreign missions."

NEW FAMILY HOBBY

Housewives, teen-agers, children and the whole family are catching onto the new craze of mounting multi-colored butterflies. According to Aminador Glanz, 47 year old collector who started chasing butterflies as a boy and never stopped, the American family has taken to this fascinating educational hobby.

Mr. Glanz, as far as he knows, is the only butterfly wholesaler in the world. He owns Butterfly Art Jewelry, Inc., located at 231 East 98th Street, Brooklyn 12, New York which has put together this butterfly mounting kit completely equipped with nine special tools and ten brilliantly colored butterfly files.

The Brooklyn company imports butterflies from all over the world for distribution to homes, retailers, museums, hospitals and allied groups. The butterfly mounting kits, which sell for only three dollars, are being used by leading educators and teachers as an effective tool to interest juveniles in a fascinating hobby. The parents and senior children can create their own beautiful decorative schemes using the colorful butterflies to make wall plaques, lamp shades, lamps, ash trays, serving trays, etc. For the children these kits provide an interesting opportunity to study nature and science and are in constant demand in the schools for the study of Lepidoptera (butterflies).

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
