

The Rev. Tollie LeRoy Caution, D.D., Assistant Secretary, Division of Domestic Missions of the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church, became ason June 1, 1945. He succeeded the Rt. Rev. Bravid W. Harris, now Bishop of Liberia, who had been Secretary for Negro Work.

Dr. Caution is a native of Balismore, Md. He attended the public schools there, then entered Lincoin University, Pa., where he received an A.B. degree, graduating cum laude. He took ns theological studies at the Philadelphia Divinity School, receiving an S.T.B. degree, and graduating magna cum laude. His graduate work was done at the University of Pennsylvania where he received an M.A. de-

Dr. Caution was ordained to the diaconate in June, 19and advanced to the priesthood later the same year. In June, 1947 his alma mater, Lincoln University, awarded him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

His first work in the ministry was as curate of St. James' Church, Baltimore, Md. He became vicar of St. Philip's Church, Cumberland, Md., and successively, vicar of St. John's Church, Myersdale, Pa., Holy Cross Church, Harrisburgh, Pa., Priestin-charge of St. Barnabas' Church, Altoona, Pa, rector of St. Augustine's Church, Philadelphia, Pa., and vicar of St. Lukes' Church, New York City.
