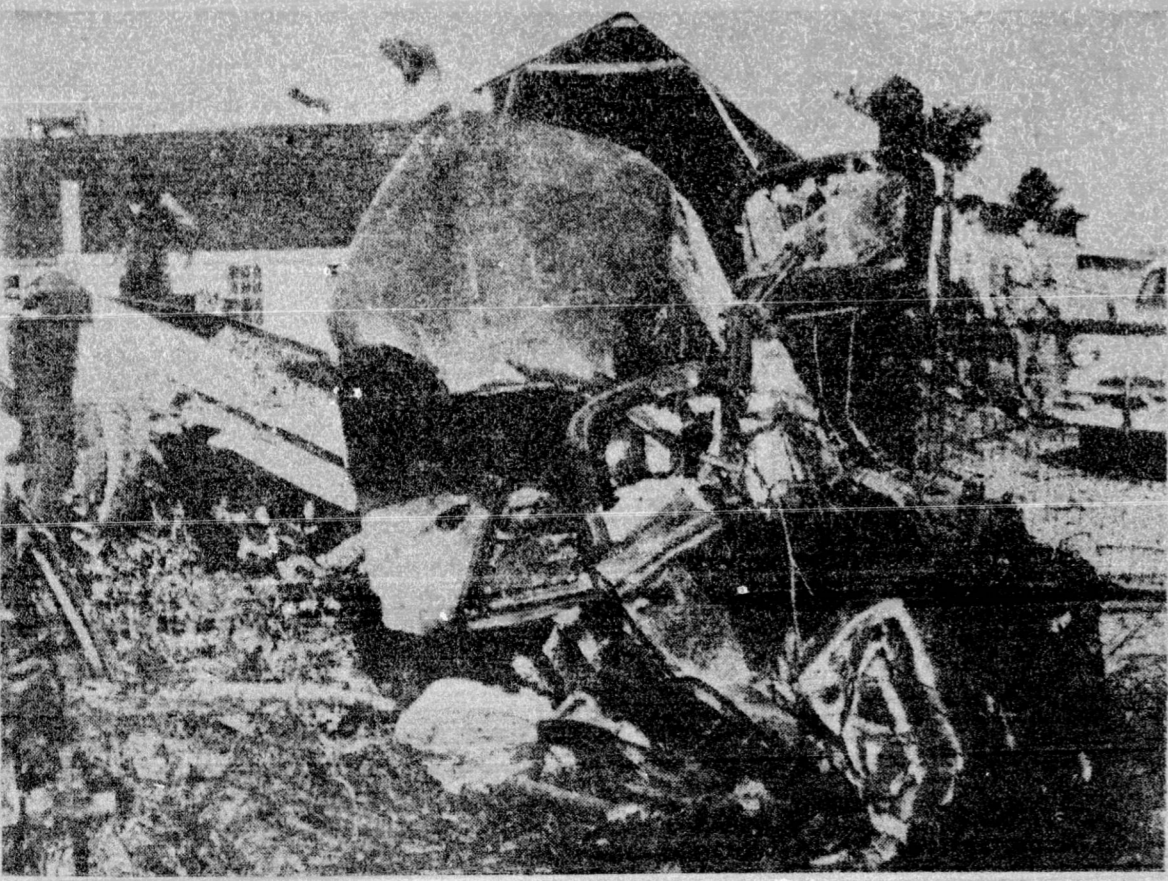


# WRECK KILLS WOMAN, BROS.

Negroes are reported to be working in key positions both in Greensboro and Birmingham, Ala-

bama. Another member of the Association placed the blame on the fact that since the most of the employees were to be women, that Negro women were being left out so that they might remain in the homes of the whites or the community, as servants. The Association voted to call a boycott on Westinghouse products and said that it would institute a program that would carry throughout the country. This was decided to be the most plausible way to break the back of the bias. The St. Agnes Hospital situation claimed much attention. The
