Back Of The Great Decision

Long before the philosopher-lawyer Charles Sumner attempted to have the United States constitution applied to the legal rights of a colored child in the state of Massachusetts, The Church of England and several wings of other protestant churches in the colonies in cooperation with the southern landed gentry had foisted racial status upon the child in the case, colored people in the United States had become, by successive stages of legislation, restricted people in the exercise of privileges in the country.

The Boston judge rendered an opinion bolstered by status quo in state laws to the South and by prejudices in Massachusetts learned from the slaveholders and those with whom they did business all up and down the Atlantic coast. Historically and ethically the opinion was not supported by truth. The declaration that prevailing prejudices had not been caused by law was historically untrue. Restrictive legislation enacted for the benefit of slaveholders had successfully treated colored people as outcasts or suffer a loss of social prestige. The declaration that separation of children by race for educational purposes was not discriminatory came as a corollary to the first error. The truth was that the chief cause of the prejudiced status quo lay in the laws of the slave states and in the constitutional compromises. Once this prejudice was established throughout the nation, the thus prejudiced eye could not see the racial discrimination in forced segregation.

The extent to which the fourth article of the constitution had been nullified in practice was shown clearly in the Dredd Scott Decision. Color caste had been built by conformity to state legislation. Judge Taney's ruling that a Negro had no rights which a white man was bound to respect was a ruling of legal status "accorded" the colored people IN SPIRIT of the fourth article of the constitution. The decisions in the Slaughter House Cases after the fourth amendment was in the constitution created a doctrine of property rights which beclouded the human rights intent of the amendment. The idea grew that the right to hold property was the only civil right.
