1. To figure length of first strip of paper, measure wall with yardstick. Place one end of yard-stick as high as paper should stick as high as paper should suck as high as paper should side the first cut strip... match-reach (to molding or ceiling). Measure from ceiling to base-board. Cut paper about eight inches longer than wall height to allow less chance of being caught short ... and to give extra length to work with. 2.
