6 Negroes Among 50 New Extension Agents In NC

Six Negroes will be appointed to positions as a result of a decision to use the bulk of North Carolina's share of recent approved federal funds to employ 50 assistant farm and home agents and secretaries, according to the director of the state extension service.

The extension service, through its farm and home agents in the counties and specialists at the colleges, traditionally has provided advice to farm people on specific projects or enterprises.

With increased demands on agents' time, there has been a decreasing opportunity to give an overall planning service to individual farms, said D. S. Weaver.

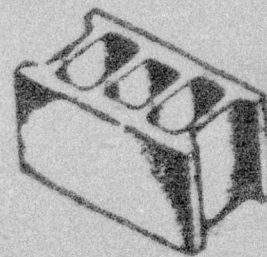

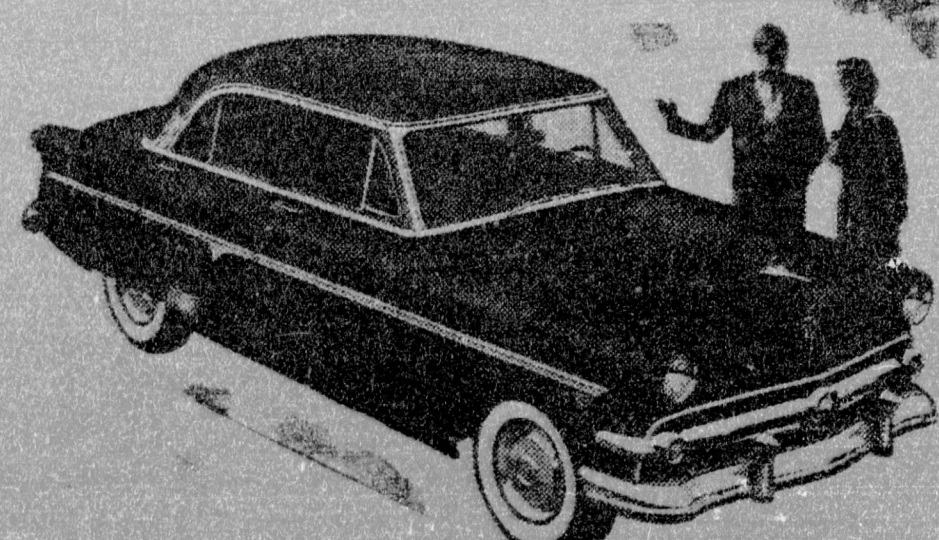

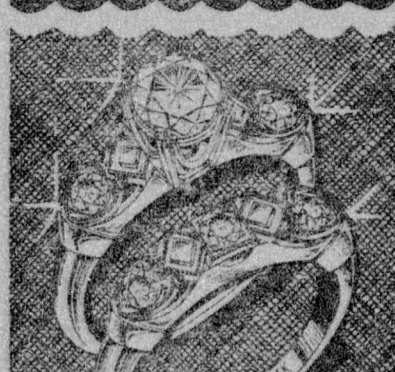
