NC Farmer Gets Much From Small Acreage

GREENSBORO (ANP) — Farmers with small acreages may get a lot more from the experience of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Bigelow, Greensboro county, who have gone a long way towards finding a solution to the small farm problem.

Recent studies in the county reveal the average Negro farm is just a little more than 2 1/2 acres. The Bigelow farm, 2 1/2 acres, 2 1/2 that size, but with farm economic maintenance that a farm of less than 20 acres is likely to be unprofitable under modern agricultural standards.

The Bigelows, who raised desperation, have refused to face defeat with their small holdings. They have taken what they need to get the most out of all they have and only made a living out of the small farm for themselves and nine children, but one has completed college and the other has entered the army. 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
