

The president expressed his regret over the fact that Mr. Roosevelt had seen fit to object to the award and added "The association is proud to add Dr. Bunche's name to the illustrious roster of Theodore Roosevelt Medal winners and anticipates with pleasure the honor of presenting the medal to him Wednesday eve-


