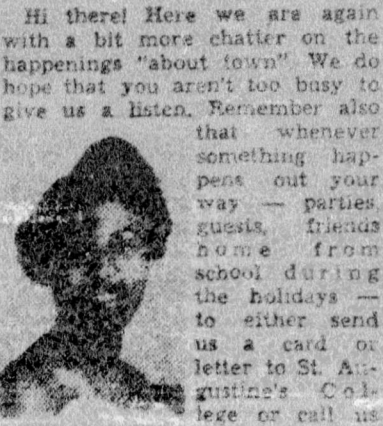

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The Childrens' BOOK WORLD

As a reply to the request of a young future teacher of Raleigh, this week's column treats the teaching of children's literature in the classroom. We hope it hasn't come too late.

In the judgment of the writer at least three fundamental provisions must be made if the teaching of children's literature is to result in the development of interest in the taste for good reading material. A brief discussion of these provisions is given in the following paragraphs.

1. No teacher can hope to motivate the study purpose in teaching children's literature unless the needed reading material is available for the use of her pupils. The material must include material which is old and new, classic and contemporary, factual and fictional, poetry and story.

2. The material chosen should represent a wide range of mood. The selections should cover a wide range of peoples and countries.

3. It is important that children's literature be taught in such a way that the child experiences what the writer means or story has to tell. This means that the teaching or use of a selection must center upon helping the pupil live the incidents, see the sights, hear the sounds and feel the feelings presented in the selection.

4. The point of view that children's literature is reading matter to be read and enjoyed, not subject matter to be studied or information to be retained, is essential to effective teaching.

Reading material for children fall into four general types:

1. "Factual which reports actual experience, episodes and incidents, such as Chapman's "Travels of Broke" (2). That which is true to life but does not report actual

occurrences, (3) that which is fanciful, such as nonsense fables and fairytales and (4) that which pretends, but fails, to relate "true occurrences of to be true to life, such as cheap adventure stories. Obviously, the teacher's choices should be made from the first three types. The fourth type should be disregarded.

In selecting literature remember the following points:

The selections to be used must cover a wide range. The offerings should include selections in history, travel, science, biography, industry, art, music, poetry and classical prose ballads, fables, folk tales, myths, legends, fairy tales, short stories and books of fiction. If one purpose in teaching literature is to extend and enrich the child's experiences, it is important that the material selected provide a wide range of experiences.

The material chosen should represent a wide range of mood. The selections should cover a wide range of peoples and countries.

And finally there must be a wide range of selections according to reading difficulty. This range should include books written so simple that the poorest reader in the class can read them. In addition some books must be difficult enough to challenge the interest and reading power of the best reader in the class.

Little needs to be said on the importance of different forms of reading materials necessary to permit the carrying on of important types of lessons or activities in literature. Above all, the materials which are put into the hands of pupils should be attractive and inviting in physical appearance, with good illustrations, sound use of color, clear legible type, durable binding and good quality paper.
