#### HEALTH REPORT

By ALEXANDER BARNES An exhaustive report, released by Jaque B. Norman, of the health facilities of Wake County, not only recommended the closing of St. Agnes Hospital but deplored the conditions of all the hospita facilities of Raleigh and Wake

The survey took into consideration that the 1950 cen-sus showed that there were 136.450 people in the county in 1950 and that the 1960 census would show 173,200 with hospital facilities not able to meet the needs now to say nothing of the situation that would be faced by 1960.

The report compared Wake County with other counties within a 50 mile radius and showed that it was far behind in its hospital facilities. One of the alarm ing points in the report was that Negroes represented 32 per cent of the population and that out of 1,215 Newro births during the year only 47.8 per cent were hos-pital cases, while 98.3 per cent of (CONTINUED ON PAGE EIGHT)
