### Dig Up Body Of Man Who Died Dec. 10

41-year-old Eugene McCulley of Mebane who died last December 10, apparently of a hart attack, was exhumed on Friday morning iollowing a report that the man may have been poisoned.

The body was taken from a grave in the Presbyterian Church cemetery behind the Mbane school and an autopsy performed by Dr. George Kerr, local pathologist. Dr. KKerr advised Dr. J. B. Walker, Jr., Alamance country coroner, that his examination showed that McCulley did not die of natural causes, thus ruling out the earlier verdict that he had died of a heart condition.

Tissues from vital organs were forwarded to Duke Hospital and a report is expected this week on whether McCulley was poisoned or not. The man was found in the yard of his home about 3:30 p.m. on December 10. He was removed to his home where he died about
