Explosion Tears Head From Body

YOUNGSVILLE - Horace W. Jones, 39, was killed instantly on Monday when a dynamite charge exploded as he was tamping it into a hole at the Bryan Rock and Sand Company quarry at Roles-

The body of Jones was blown 86 feet, disemboweling him and blowing off his head and his left arm. Raymond Reid of Zebulon Route 4, received eye and facial injuries and was treated by a Zebulon doctor. His condition was not believed to be critical.

Coroner Marshall W. Bennett ager with a powder company was at the quarry at the time of the explosion. He quoted him as say-ign that he had found no cause for the blast.

Jones and other workers had sunk one charge of dynamite in the hole and were engaged in sinking another, when it hung. Jones towered a rope with a lead weight to dislodge the hung dynamite
