African-Asians Hit Racial Segregation

BANDUNG, Indonesia, (AP)—There are going to be in the future, no "yes men" in Africa and Asia.

With these words, Prime Minister Nehru of India summed up the week of words and deliberations written and spoken at the historic 29-nation conference of the world's colored peoples.

Nehru said the conference gives Asia and Africa new influence and that the countries would cooperate with the West, "only as equals."

Although the talks, which ended Sunday, was in theory a gigantic discussion group, attending nations passed several resolutions denouncing racialism and calling for an end to colonialism.

Among the important stands taken by the conference were statements calling for:

- 1. Support for the "courageous stand taken by victims of racial discrimination, especially by the peoples of African, Indian and Pakistan origin South Africa.
- 2. Economic cooperation among the Asian-African countries "on the basis of mutual interest and respect for national sovereignty."
- 3. Full support for the principle of self-determination "of peoples and nations," as set forth in the United Nations charter.

The spotlight of the conference in the main turned on the problems of Asia and China's Premier, Chou En-lai and Nehru proved to be 2

GOLDSBORO — Jerdine King, 9-year-old girl of Rt. 1, Faison, is in critical condition at Wayne Memorial Hospital after being run over by a school bus driven by her brother Monday afternoon. According to a story given to Willie Curran of the Highway Patrol here by the driver, Joe Lewis King, 17, the girl was the last of four to get off the school bus, and apparently dropped her books and had stooped down to pick them up. The driver thought she had gone and pulled the bus up, running over her with the right rear wheel. The girl suffered injuries to the head, face, right leg, hip and arm. The accident occurred on N. C. Highway 50, about seven miles west of Faison.

Roy D. Moore To Assume Position At S. C. State

Roy D. Moore, head coach at St. Augustine's College here since 1942, will assume a position as Athletic Director and Head Coach at South Carolina State College, Orangeburg, S. C. on June 1.

Upon leaving Saint Augustine's, he will become the second Raleigh coach to give up a position in less than a year. Howard K. (Dubs) Wilson left Shaw University last June.

In an interview with the CAROLINIAN, Moore said he is going to the Palmetto state institution because he "can't refuse those green portraits of old presidents."

RAISED ATHLETIC STANDING

Moore's contribution to the athletic life of Saint Augustine's College is no secret to lovers of sports. He became coach at the institution when the Falcon's football and basketball standings were not even rated by the CCAA and raised the standings of both sports to commanding positions in the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Hold Cripple In Rooming House Death

KINSTON (MIB)—One is dead and another is in jail following a fracas at a local rooming house. Sam Brewer, 33 of Cox's Flat, is in jail charged with the murder of John "Mule" Vause, 23, of Lenoir County.

Brewer, slightly-built and crippled in one leg, admitted to Kinston police that he stabbed Vause on top of the head during a fracas late Saturday in Cox's flat.

The man, however, claimed that the deceased was attacking him with an axe at the time. But police said no axe was found at the death scene.

The killing apparently climaxed a fracas which arose when Brewer allegedly informed Vause that the rooming house operator had left word he was not to re-enter the dwelling.

After sustaining the fatal wound Vause ran some 200 feet before falling in the street, dying en route to Lenoir Memorial Hospital.

A.M.E. PRELATE BURIED TUESDAY

ATLANTA — Death came to Bishop W. A. Fountain here Saturday morning after a lingering illness and more than a half century of work in the A.M.E. Church.

The Bishop weathered many storms in the life of the church, but was considered one of the leading churchmen of his time. Funeral services were conducted from Big Bethel A.M.E. Church, here Tuesday.

The prelate was retired from active service at the last general conference, at which time he was the senior Bishop of the denomination. He was prominent in politics both in and out of the church.

He was the father of four girls and one boy. The son, Dr. W. A. Fountain, preceded him in death, just a few years ago. Mrs. Louise Fountain Perrin, head of the social science department, Ligon Junior-Senior High School, Raleigh, North Carolina, is one of the surviving daughters.

CORONER HOLDS FATE OF ACCUSED KINSTON SLAYER

KINSTON (MIB)—The fate of Willie Olds, 55, who has been charged with the fatal shooting of Levi Hawkins, 45, of route 2 Kinston, rests on the official ruling of County Coroner, Raymond Jarman.

Hawkins was shot April 11 when he went to Olds' store to get after him for beating his sister. Observers say that Hawkins was waving his .32 pistol at Olds cursing and talking about what he was going to do, when Olds slipped his hand under the counter and came out with his .32 pistol and shot Hawkins between the eyes.

Hawkins was rushed to Lenoir Memorial Hospital where he received emergency treatment. He was later taken to the Veterans Hospital at Chapel Hill where he lived for 9 days. He died Wednesday night, April 29 shortly before 10 p.m.

WASHINGTON — The American Methodist Episcopal Church is urging that the church in Maryland should be more economical in its operation of schools.

Told at the annual conference of the church in Miami, Fla. The Financial Board, presided over by its chairman, The Rt. Rev. D. O. Walker, Bishop of the Fifth Episcopal District, unanimously received the 82nd Annual Report of its Secretary, and the first made by Dr. R. W. Mance, who succeeded the late Dr. A. S. Jackson, who died last year.
