Brewer, slightly-built and crippled in one leg, admitted to Kinsion police that he stabbed Vause one time in the heart during a fracas late Saturday in Cox's flat. The man, however, claimed that the deceased was attacking him with an axe at the time. But, police said no axe was found at the death scene. The killing apparently climaxed a fracas which arose when Brewer allegedly informed Vause that the

ATLANTA — Death came to Bishop W. A. Fountain here Saturday morning after a lingering illness and more than a half century of work in the A.M.E. Church.

The Bishop weathered many storms in the life of the church, but was considered one of the leading churchmen of his time. Funeral services were conducted from Big Bethel A.M.E. Church, here

Tuesday. The prelate was retired from active service at the last general conference, at which time he was the senior Bishop of the denomination.
