Dr. Frederick Patterson Fayetteville's Keynoter

FAYETTEVILLE—The seventy-eighth annual commencement exercises were held at the Fayetteville State Teachers College on Tuesday, May 31, in the college auditorium. Dr. Frederick D. Patterson, President of the Phelps-Stokes Fund and of the United Negro College Fund, delivered the commencement address to 132 seniors in the Class of '55. A dynamic platform speaker and a man of high repute in education and social science, Dr. Patterson spoke from the topic, "The Era That Beckons." Top honors in the 1955 graduating class went to Doris L. Batts of Scotland Neck and Ethel M. Egan of Council Bluffs, Iowa.

Calvert Honors Carver's "Heir"

The latest "Successful Man" chosen by the makers of Lord Calvert is Dr. Arthur Curtis, an assistant to the great Dr. George Washington Carver. Dr. Curtis is now vice president of Curtis Detering Company, Dr. Curtis has prominent chemical background.

Before he reached 21 he had obtained a Ph.D. in plant physiology and water colors from Mississippi State College.

It was this work that brought him to the attention of Dr. Carver and then won for him the post of his chemical assistant.

Mutual respect grew between the two men despite the difference in their ages. They became constant companions. Dr. Carver often spoke of Dr. Curtis as "an extension of my work."

Dr. Curtis has since worked many of his projects. In 1939 he developed an inexpensive durable house paint for the Tennessee Valley Authority. Its basic ingredients were motor oil and clay.

Later, he declined a lucrative Government post to remain with the aging "Wizard of Tuskegee." After Dr. Carver's passing, young Curtis refused offers of industry. Instead he founded his own De-

troit Laboratories. Here he trains and helps talented young Negroes in chemistry. Dr. Curtis has also converted many magical formulae into new, useful consumer products.

The makers of Lord Calvert selected Dr. Curtis as the current "Man of Distinction" because of his scientific accomplishment. They consider him an outstanding example of social contribution, possible when talents are permitted to freely express themselves.

GENIUS OF DR. BETHUNE CITED

MACKINAC ISLAND, Michigan—The genius of Mary McLeod Bethune, founder and first president of the National Council of Negro Women of America, lived for us, would here this week. Mrs. Bethune's distinctive part in the recent Bandung Conference was disclosed. She met Dr. Jamali, former Premier of Iraq, and a delegate to Bandung, at a Mackinac Assembly for Moral Re-Armament last fall. She had strong conviction about the answer the nations of Africa and Asia could give the world. At the Assembly at Washington, D. C. early this year she sat with the delegates from India, Africa, Japan, Egypt and the Mid-

dle East.

During the last year Mrs. Bethune, aged 80, not only came to Mackinac Island and to Washington, D. C., but also flew to Switzerland to take part in the World Assembly for Moral Re-Armament there. In her last newspaper article, now appearing in many American newspapers, she writes, "I have attended many great assemblies of the world, but not until 1954 when I went to Paris, Switzerland, and I really face the total absence of segregation, discrimination, and the things that would separate man from man. There shall be no more war and hatred, but a great change of heart and action in all of us that will illumine the world."
