

293 NC STUDENTS GRADUATE AT DURHAM AS COLLEGE CONFIRES DEGREES ON 342 SENIORS

DURHAM — Two hundred and thirty-three North Carolina students were among the 342 candidates to undergo undergraduate and professional degrees awarded yesterday, May 31, at North Carolina College's 41st Commencement exercises.

Walter Mathew Brown, 26-year-old Durham war veteran and North Carolina College alumnus, received the first Ph.D. degree to be awarded at a southern institution offering graduate education for Negroes.

Of the degrees awarded, 68 were Bachelor of Arts, 72 were Bachelor of Science, 73 Bachelor of Science in Commerce, 11 Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, 64 Master of Arts, 16 Master of Science, 31 Master of Science in Library Science, 4 Bachelor of Laws, and 1 Doctor of Philosophy.

Sixty-four Durham students were among the recipients of degrees, 18 of whom graduated by degrees.

GRIMESBORO — If you want to become a good leader, don't go to the front of your folks — Dr. Franklin H. Nutt, associate dean of the graduate school at Woman's College, suggests student leaders at Bennett College study on "The Nature of Leadership" or traditional exercises involving the offices of student organizations for the ensuing school year. GRENSBORO — Approval of a half-million-dollar budget for the 1955-56 school year and the granting of an interim increase of \$30,000 for the first half of the year was taken by the executive committee of the Greensboro trustee board in session yesterday.

Dr. W. C. Jackson, chairman of the board, presided at the sessions which were held at the home of the president and James J. Sciarato, business manager, presented the budget which was set at \$552,550, an increase of \$35,250 over the 1954-55 figures.
