Williston Rallies To Defeat Ligon

WILMINGTON — The Tigers of Williston High School here came from behind in the second half to win three touchdowns in a scrappy game at Ligon High School 19-9.

The visiting Little Blues took the lead in the first quarter. A pass from Walter Browning to Alexander Curran took the ball from mid-field to the Williston 23-yard line. A 15-yard penalty took the ball to the 8 and Browning racked up a score from there.

The 6-0 lead that the Little Blues held at halftime didn't last long.

Williston intercepted a pass early in the third period and took the ball on a 45-yard scoring march. Murray converted and the score was then tied 9-9.

Another score was racked up by the local eleven when a punt was blocked.

Williston covered on the Blues three and Rogers went over for the touchdown. The Blues fumbled the kickoff with Williston recovering on the 20. This touchdown was credited to Brown.

This was a no-confidence game and the Little Blues play was led by Charles Hubert and Alexander Curran.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Howard University opens its grid season of varsity football Saturday, Sept. 24, when it meets Shaw University in a Central Inter-Collegiate Athletic Association game at Raleigh, N. C. Game time is 2:00 p. m.

This will be the 27th meeting of the two teams in a rivalry which dates back to 1909. Howard leads in the series with a record of 17 wins, seven losses, and two ties. It will also mark the first time the two charter members of the 15-team CIAA have met since 1951 when Howard won, 20-12.

Howard completed its third week of pre-season drills yesterday Saturday, and Coach Tom Johnson, was greatly pleased with the team's performance.

George Roberts, 190 lb., Howard guard will be in the starting lineup when the Bears meet Shaw

University's Bears Saturday. Roberts is a graduate of Washington High School, Raleigh.

Lawrence Ashley, 170 lb., Howard University quarterback, is also expected to see action Saturday. Ashley, 1-9, is a graduate of Washington High School, Raleigh.

"This is the best material we've had since I've been at the helm," said Johnson, "and with a break in two we could go all the way."

The national Johnson referred to consisted of 45 players, mostly sophomores and juniors, who appear to have both the size and the speed to become a winning combination. And although Johnson says he can't have to be pared from the squad prior to Saturday's game, the cutting is required by a new conference rule which limits teams to 36 men.

The Shaw University Bears seem to be getting off to a good start, having defeated two colleges in practice games before they open their official season against the Bisons of Howard University.

The Bears, coached by Robert Brown, traveled to Fayetteville on Saturday, September 10, and defeated the Broncos, coached by Howard Gaines, by the score of 46-0.

Last Saturday the Bears played host to Benedict College and won over the South Carolina College by a 19-7 score.

Brown, starting his second year as coach at the Baptist institution, has expressed confidence in the 1955 edition of the Shaw Bears and believes that they will be near the top when the final gun sounds in CIAA competition.

The team is composed mainly of freshmen and sophomores.

This was the first time the Bears had met Benedict College in five years. Last year they played Fort Bragg and Fayetteville in pre-season scraps.

Shaw opens its current season here Saturday when the Bisons of Howard University will clash with the locals at 2 p. m. at Chavis Park.

Dudley High Defeats Carver 25-6

GREENSBORO — The Dudley High School football team, coached by Coach J. H. Jones, defeated Carver 25-6 in the first game of the season at 8 p. m.

The game played under the lights was the first encounter for Dudley High School this season. Carver had played the previous week at Charlotte, emerging victorious with a 14-0 score, but it was a very different story this time after the first eight minutes.

Carver's score came early in the game. It was set up by a 15-yard pass from Coach Jones to Dudley's 48. From there, James Tillery, the quarterback for Carver, and another performed at Carver, topped back to his own 49 yard line and heaved a long punt to the end zone. When the Richmond outfit kicked the Aggies last year 14-0, it was the first time since 1947, and the locals have not fully recovered from that smug and surprising defeat.

The rivalry between the two institutions, which dates back to the early twenties, rates among the keenest and bitterest competition in the conference. Because it is always an early season encounter, the comparative advance hope

usually has little influence in the final outcome.

The Greensboro outfit is taking this one seriously. All last week Bill Bell and his staff were working a frenzied pitch, trying desperately to piece together a lineup which could solve the 17-year-old feud for which Tom Harris, Union member, is noted. Among Bell's chief woes is an adequate replacement for Lonnie Hall at the quarterback post, and he also has worries about game holes in his forward wall. "The 1955 hopes," he has been heard in the history of the rivalry, with the use expedition. "If we can't find some solution to these major problems," says Bell, "we expect to do considerably better than last year. At least, we will be ready for Union."
