School Officials In Palmetto State Nix Integration Move

CHARLESTON, S. C. — (AP) — At their first fall meeting last week, city school trustees announced that there would be no change in the enrollment policy as yet.

Chairman C. A. Brown, with the approval of the board, forwarded a letter to J. Arthur Brown, president of the Charleston branch of the NAACP.

The letter to Brown of the NAACP read in part: "It is inadvisable at this time to make any changes in policy as to the enrollment of pupils."

The board is unprepared to

make any mass changes in the assignment of pupils to the various schools considering such changes impracticable and inadvisable now.

The application of each pupil must be taken up on merit. There are many considerations other than color which must be taken into account by the board in assigning pupils to the various schools of this district.

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP) — Despite the efforts of segregationists and other opponents of integrated education, public, private school and college enrollment is expected to top last year's figure by 1,637,000. Last year, 37,900,000 students enrolled throughout the country, as compared to the 38,537,000 predicted for this year.
