FBI Probes

Kidnap-Beating Of Man

CAROLINA, Ala. — (AP)—The FBI is conducting an investigation into the case of a Negro who was kidnaped and beaten by three white men in a mysterious incident reported.

The white men, Wiley McGee, 24, a service station operator, Cecil Sullivan, 27, and James L. Roberts, 25, a saw-mill operator, all of Gordo, Ala., have been charged by the state with kidnaping. Under state law, the men can be sentenced to a maximum of 10 years each on the kidnaping charge. If the FBI finds violations of Federal kidnap laws, they will face a death penalty.

The victim was Matt Jones, 21, who was released by the men on U. S. 82 in Pickens County. His abductors were arrested a short time later by Sheriff R. R. Shields.

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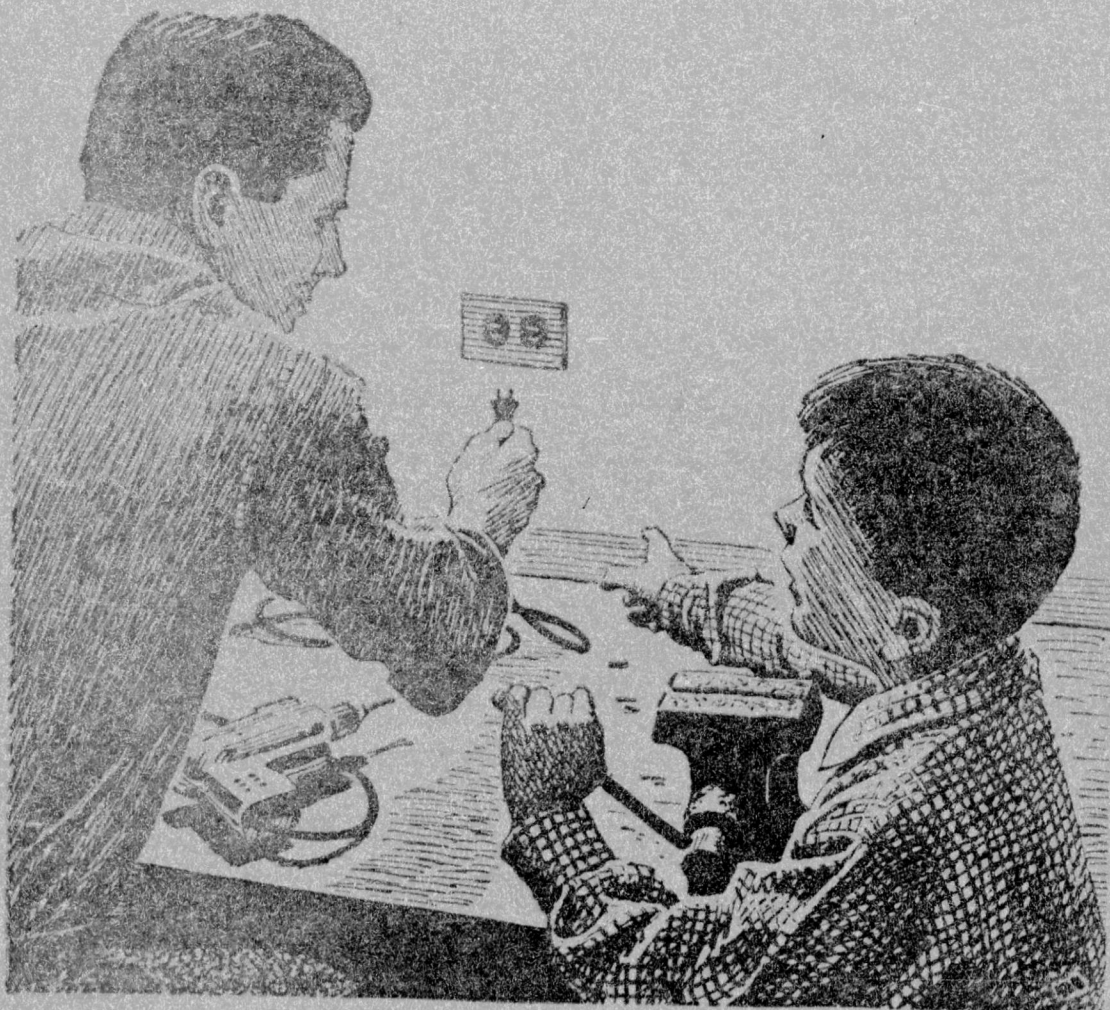
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
