Jim Crow School Law Invalid In Tenn.

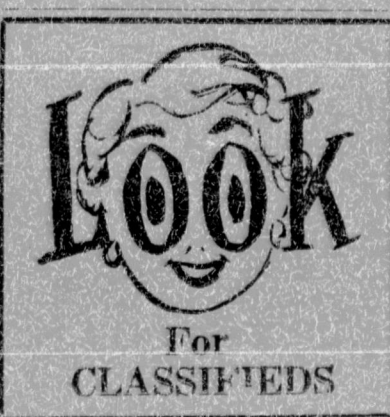

GOLDSBORO — Warring factions in the New Bethel Free Will Baptist Church here clashed Sunday, with the result that 13 members of one group and 13 of the other were placed under \$100 bond each to the October 18 term of County Court.

COPS SUMMONED TO HALT RIOT AT CHURCH RITES

Each group swore out warrants charging the other with "disturbing a religious service" as the culmination of a long-standing dispute. They were bound over by Magistrate L. C. Eatman.

Dispute for control of the church, whose membership is less than 70, has twice been aired in Superior Court. Last fall, Judge Clawson Williams issued a temporary restraining order forbidding both sides to interfere with each other in holding services at the church.

She is a member of a 60 member delegation that was sent over to create interest in support of Radio Free Europe and Free Europe Press. Dr. Woolridge was chosen for her outstanding work by Mrs. Vivian Mason, president of the National Council of Negro Women to represent the Council.

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Police Hold Man, Woman In Deaths Of Two Persons

Blazing guns claimed two lives over the weekend, resulting in the holding of a Burlington man and a New Bern woman without bond pending police investigation.

The case at Burlington might well be termed the "Doubtful Thomas Murder," as a result of police reports that Paul Terrell, 24, who doubted that John T. Burnett, 44, would make good his threat to shoot him, discovered too late that he was wrong.

Police say that Burnett and Terrell were involved in a "minor" argument at the Zanzibar Club, a nightclub on the outskirts of town. They report that Burnett walked up to Terrell, showed him a fistful of 32 caliber bullets and said, "Do you think I've got anything that will take these?"

Terrell answered in the negative, police say. Burnett produced a .32 caliber revolver and loaded it. "Do you believe I'll shoot you? Then is said to have asked Terrell.

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Go Where Jobs Are, Shaw Future Teachers Advised

Dr. W. L. Greene, executive of Teachers Association spoke to Shaw University students Monday, at the second in a series of programs on vocational guidance on "Are You Planning To Teach?"

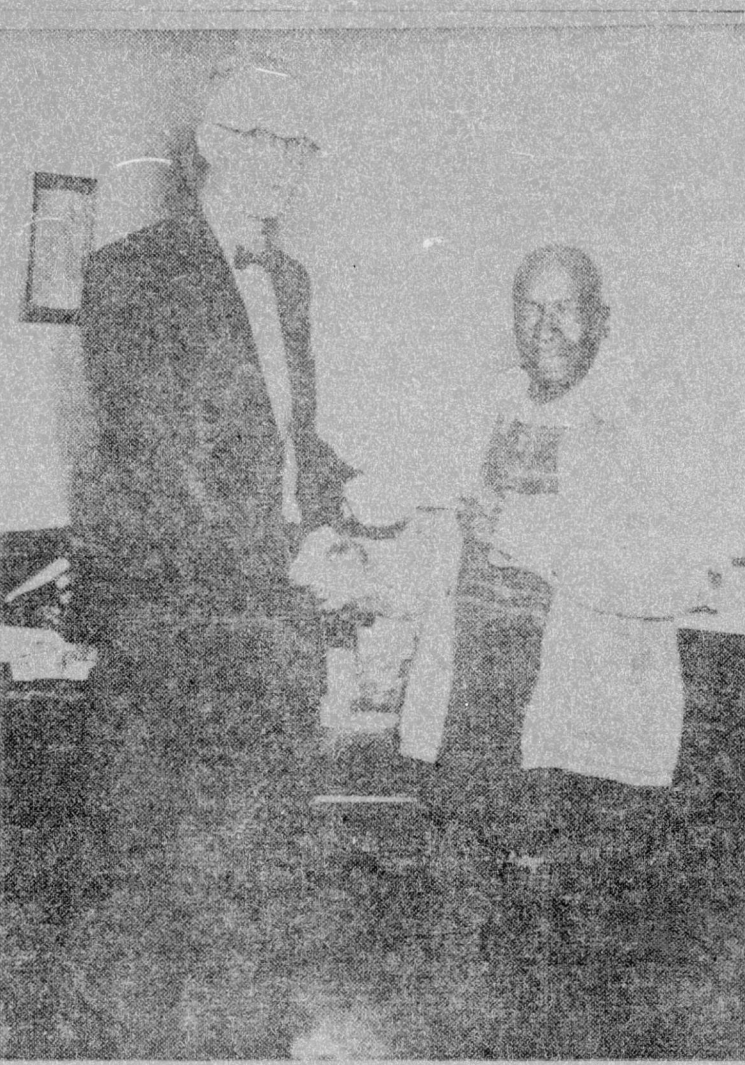
He told the group that, due to the oversupply of Negro teachers in this section, the security factor is gradually disappearing and employment in this field has now become a very selective process.

He advised the students to ask themselves these questions: 1. Am I a person in good health? 2. How is my I.Q.? 3. Is my personality balanced and integrated? 4. Can I take low with dignity? 5. Am my values higher than the salary for which I will have to work?

"Teaching," he declared, "requires a person with good health and I.Q. to be successful in fifth year graduation and the ability of making the most of one's personality. He held of the profession as a "good-paying one" which requires a person who can be humble with dignity.

The speaker stated that there is not a shortage of teachers but a maldistribution of teacher placement as there is an oversupply of

Leslie Clee Hicks, white, former law enforcement officer, was waterily eyed as he heard two judges sentence him to 2 years of labor on the roads of Wake County here Wednesday, as he faced multiple charges in both Federal and Domestic Relations Courts for violating the "White Slave" laws of the state.

Hicks was tried along with Connie Mack Lassiter, Johnny Cox, Mrs. Victoria Jackson and Bruce Evans for the part that they played in a sex orgy that took place on the night of October 10th. The evidence, as presented in court, revealed that Hicks picked up Carlene Murphy, white girl, age 18, on the night of the incident and took her to Bruce Evans' home on Davis Street.

Upon arriving at the Evans home, they found Cox and his 20-year-old friend, Thelma Dunn. Hicks and Cox were alleged to have engaged in a whispering conversation and when the conversation was over they decided to take a ride. They drank some whiskey, according to evidence, and they proceeded to leave. The white couple got in the back seat and Cox and his
