According to Deputy R. H. Linton, the child told him that Ganus was spending the night at her home. Her mother was away. She said that she objected to Ganus' attempts to feel her chest and legs and that he set a match to her clothes when she threatened to tell her mother.

Ganus, on the other hand, said that he was asleep and didn't know anything about the charges. Arresting officers reported finding him asleep in bed when they went to arrest him and say that he offered no resistance.
