It had to happen. Gov. Hodges insatiable demand that everybody in this state subscribe to his threats to close the public schools unless Negroes "volunteer" for segregation, had to be answered by this state's law-abiding, forward-looking citizens.

That answer has been made by

a group who wields more power than all of the rabid segregationists, the mothers of the children directly concerned by the issue of

Last week, at the state Con-Last week, at the state Convention of the North Carolina PTA in Greensboro, the president of that body reminded its members of the mandate of the U. S. Supreme Court that segregation in the public schools was unconstitutional and that with "all deliberate speed" it must be ended.

Mr. Hodges in a follow up speech tried to befuddle the PTA assembly by telling it that the Supreme Court did not order desegregation and with his usual pattern of double talk attempted o make the PTA believe that school integration was not even contemplated in the 1954 decision of that court.
