NEW YORK (AP) — Quiz show profits run up by American undergraduates has enabled an African girl to come to the United States for study next year.

A young teacher from Tanganyika is traveling to Mount Holyoke College in South Hendley, Mass. on money raised by the school's successful quiz team on radio's "College Quiz Bowl" last year.

They are using \$1000 of their winnings to pay travel expenses for an exchange student, Miss Bertha Akim 25, who arrived in New York City last week for a year of U.S. study in the field of child guidance.

The young woman, who now teaches at Lelez girls' school in Bboya has received an award from the Van Leer and Atlanta Foundations to cover all her expenses in the United States. Her scholarship will be administered by the Institute of International Education, New York City.

At 105, He's Seen A Lot, Likes To Talk

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — "Why, I used to knock my mule down with my fist, but now I talk easy and gentle to him, I'm scared not to, I can't hold him anymore."

That's the way Percy Johnson puts it. If he lives until Nov. 9, he will be 106 years old.

Born in slavery in Alabama, in 1850, Johnson saw the Civil War come and go. He saw the slaves freed, he saw five comets, a total eclipse, Presidents Lincoln, McKinley and Cleveland, in addition to confederate president Jefferson Davis, and he is still working for a living.

After leaving Montgomery Alabama, Johnson worked in Mississippi before he came to Arkansas. He began farming about 40 years ago.

His fondest subject is talking about the multitude of things he's seen.

"Jeff Davis used to live in Montgomery on Lee street in a house that took up a whole block. I know him as good as if he was kin to me."
