# Puerto Ricans Create New Race Problem In New York

NEW YORK (ANP) — The influx of Puerto Ricans into New York in the past few years has dwarfed the so-called "Negro problem" and, at the same time, created a situation for the Spanish-speaking population similar to that encountered by earlier Negro migrations from the South in the 1940's.

Like the earlier Negro mass migrations from the South, newly arriving Puerto Ricans start at the "bottom" taking over the oldest, worn out apartment houses, which they overcrowded to such an extent, these ancient buildings become hazards.

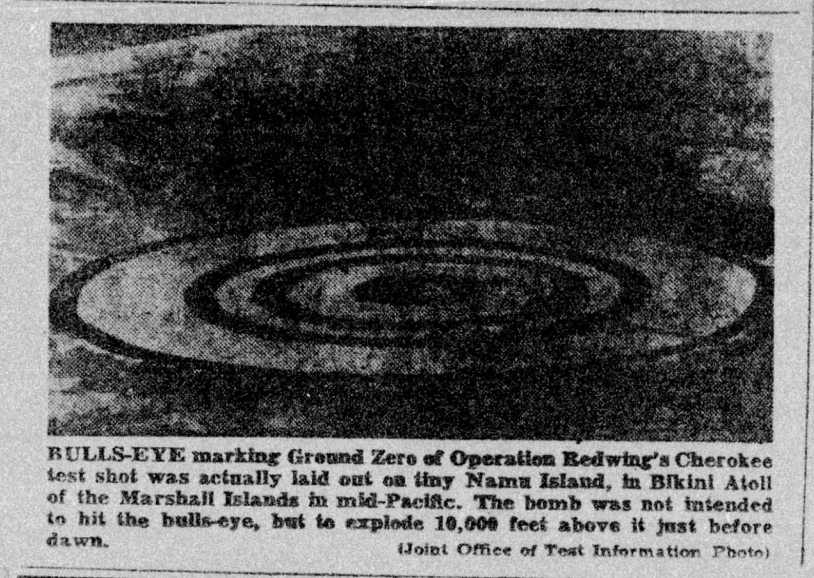
Another money making project is the Spanish language movie theater—a chain of which has sprung up dotting the five boroughs with their appealing sign-covered marquee. They have been so successful one owner quickly shot up into the millionaire class — all by presenting homesick Puerto Ricans with Spanish language films.

A recent survey in the city's metropolitan area revealed a Spanish-speaking population of 800,000. Slightly more than 70 percent of these — or nearly 600,000 — are of Puerto Rican origin, making New York have more Puerto Rican residents than any other city in the world. Eighty per cent of this population is under 44 years of age, researchers reported.

Puerto Ricans cling to the Spanish language and their island customs, a characteristic absent in American-born Negroes. Because of this, whole areas of the city are converted into "foreign quarters" with Spanish signs dominating the scene.

In recent years, plane fares from Puerto Rico have been greatly reduced. What once was a costly, long trip by a slow boat now is a cheap, quick excursion by big planes, every one of which, when New York bound, is loaded to capacity.
