The killing of Roberson was the result of another of those "unloaded guns," according to investigating officers. According to Police Lt. J. B. Samuels, four youths met at a "Juke joint," known as Willard Brodie's Grocery, located at Proctor and Ramsey Streets. The foursome decided to have some fun.

School Integration Spreads Despite South's Opposition

WHAT'S HAPPENING ON THE Desegregation Front

WORK BEGUN ON NEW DANVILLE HI SCHOOL
DANVILLE, Va. — Despite the troubled atmosphere which hangs over public education in Virginia, local school authorities are proceeding with the building of a new Negro high school, not far from Danville's three-million-dollar white high school.

Bulldozers this week began clearing the site. The John Langston High School which opened

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NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Public school desegregation will be in effect this fall in 723 school districts and school units in nine Southern and border states and the District of Columbia.

This fact was revealed this week by the monthly Southern School News, published by a group of Southern editors and educators.

The first week of school in 1956 saw additional districts in Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Kentucky, Maryland and West Virginia opening classrooms to children of both races. Some schools in these states and

Says 'Ghost' Of Plan Will Haunt State

FOUR OAKS—Passage of the Pearsall Amendment will "haunt the schools and progress of North Carolina with ghosts of tricky tactics, democracy denied, and opportunities lost," Joel A. Johnson, outspoken critic of the plan, declared here Sunday. Said Mr. Johnson: "The year will haunt a conscience and history of North Carolina because these words are even more frightening now. "We in North Carolina have lost the way for a time," Johnson went on, "but we will find the way; we will discover what a simple thing good faith is and how easily good faith eases conflicts and tensions.

A few minutes earlier, he had received a rebuff from City Manager W. H. Carper who said: "The city can't designate areas by race."

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Dentist Is Stricken In Office Here

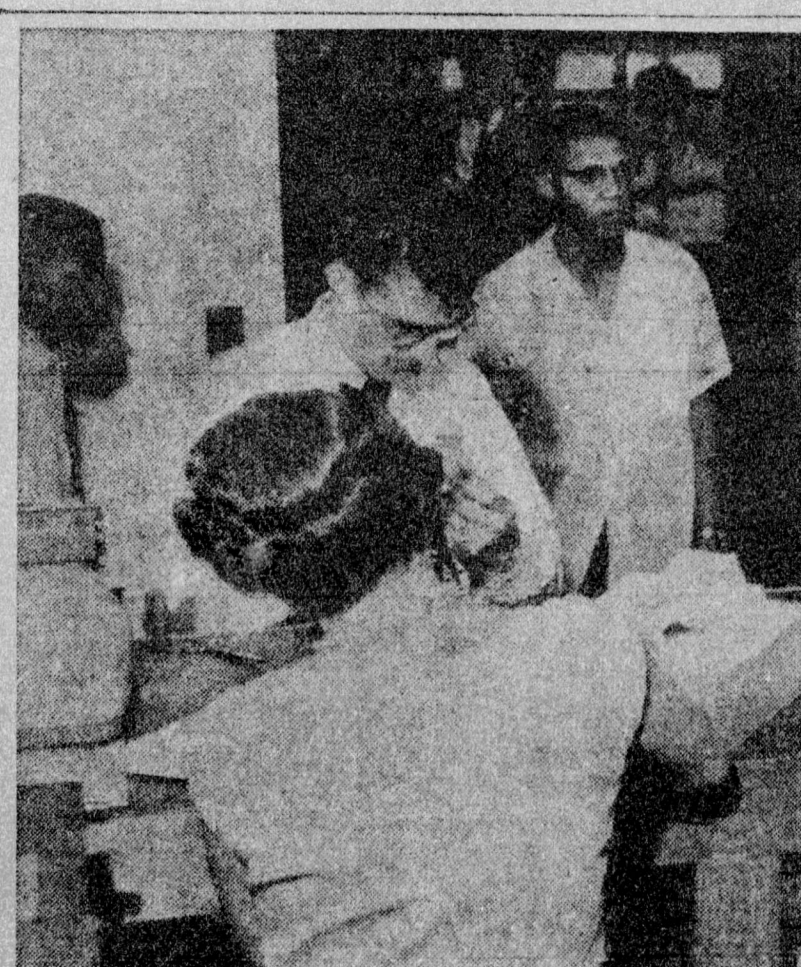

RALEIGH — Dr. Robert M. Bell, 56, prominent local dentist, was stricken by a cerebral hemorrhage in his office Monday night. At the time of the attack he was administering to a patient at 427 S. Blount Street, where he practices dentistry, and was due at the Seaboard Railroad Station where he was to meet a former classmate, coming to the city for a visit.

Although he was rendered helpless, the dentist never lost consciousness and was given aid by the patient, who has not been identified, and L. C. Rivers, manager of the New Colonnade, which is located in the same building as Dr. Bell's office. He was rushed to Saint Agnes Hospital where (CONTINUED ON PAGE 2)

Mrs. Miller described her as follows: five feet, two or three inches tall, weighing 135 pounds and wearing an Oxford gray dress with white collar, white shoes, white hat, and carrying a white pocket-book.
