RALEIGH — A 24-year-old Joe Louis Park man, sought in connection with the slaying of an elderly man, surrendered early Tuesday to the Wake County Sheriff's Department.

RALEIGH — The Rev. J. Bryan Brasington, Southern Baptist Missionary appointed for Peru, spoke at Shaw University on Monday, Oct. 22, in Greenleaf Auditorium. His message was on the "Value of Prayer." He said that the time has come when we need to tell the story of Christianity, because there are so many people who are religious, but not necessarily Christians. We need to administer to the needs of people around the world, spiritually and physically in the name of Jesus. He stated that 31 percent of the population of Peru, 10 percent in Spain have never heard an evangelical message or the Bible read.

drawn up a program designed to increase interest in the convention's objectives, Shaw University, the Oxford Orphanage, state missions, and foreign missions.

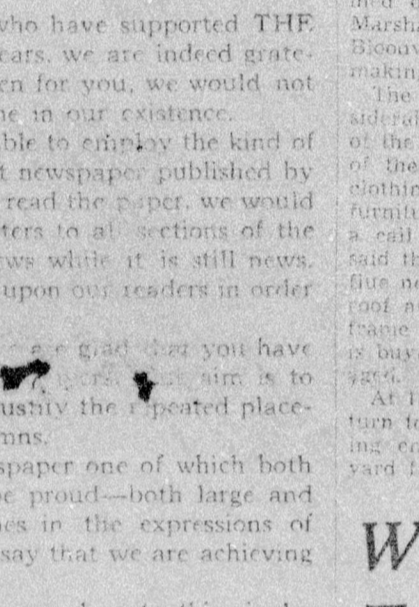

White Sheets Don't Scare Us, Says NAACP Official

WINSTON-SALEM — "I don't know that there is a 'New Negro' who is not afraid of white sheets any more," declared Mrs. Ruby Hurley at the closing meeting of the 13th North Carolina NAACP State Conference at Mt. Zion Baptist Church here Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Hurley, southeastern regional secretary of the NAACP, was referring to white southerners who, through threats, intimidations and cross-burnings are attempting to delay, if not prevent forever, the day of full equality for all citizens.

"The new Negro does not scare as easily as those who came before him," she said, in pointed reference to the activities of White Citizens' Councils and the Ku Klux Klan against Negroes because of their fight for civil rights.

Placing with her audience to "love your enemy," Mrs. Hurley admitted that "it is not

easy to be a Christian these days," as she reminded them of the violence that befell such martyrs to the cause as the late Harry T. Moore and his wife, Mrs. Mary Moore, who were blown up at Mims, Fla., and the Rev. George Lee, who was shot to death because he persisted in voting and aiding others at Belzoni, Miss.

"What is extreme about wanting to live like any other citizen?" she asked. "Negroes have made up their minds to press on for their rights in spite of the oppression and some of these days, if Autherine Lucy doesn't go to the University of Alabama, some other colored girl will."

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"We'll Live To See Complete Integration" Says Richard Nixon

NEW YORK (AP) — Pointing out that segregation, prejudice, and discrimination have no place in America, Vice-President Nixon said last week that "most of us here will live to see the day when American boys and girls shall sit side by side at any school—public or private—with no regard to the color of their skin."

Speaking at the annual Alfred E. Smith memorial dinner in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel here, Nixon proclaimed:

"I can report to you tonight that men of good will in all sections of our land are working with complete devotion toward the day when the American ideal of equality of opportunity is a reality for all of our people."
