Say Fiance In Critical Condition

Seek Bosses In Smuggling Ring

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U. S. Calls Bus Showdown

Admitted to Margaret R. Pardee Memorial Hospital at Hendersonville were:

John H. Singleton, 35, of Slater; Mrs. Singleton's husband; Ulysses Moore, 38, of Asheville; and James Arthur McMillan, 37, of Asheville, Miss Hall's fiance.

The conditions of Moore and McMillan were reported critical and Singleton, serious.

Treatment Given

Given dispensary treatment were Mrs. Roberta Moore, of Asheville, and her husband, James, 28.

State Highway Patrol Pfc. Dan W. Prady reported the south-bound auto skidded on the ram-pet pavement and turned sideways into the path of the truck driven by Singleton.

In the auto, Prady said, were Miss Hall, McMillan, and the three Moores.

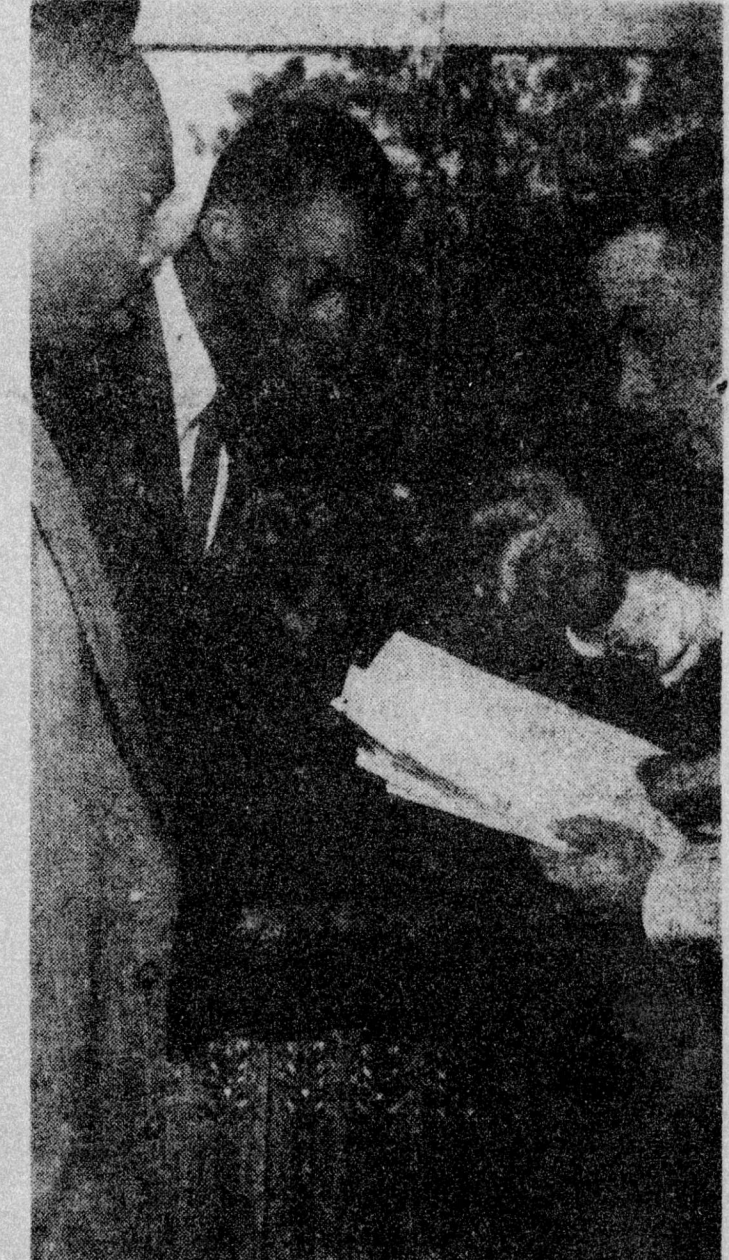
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U. S. Moves To Break Up Bus JC

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All Quiet After Axe, Screwdriver Battle

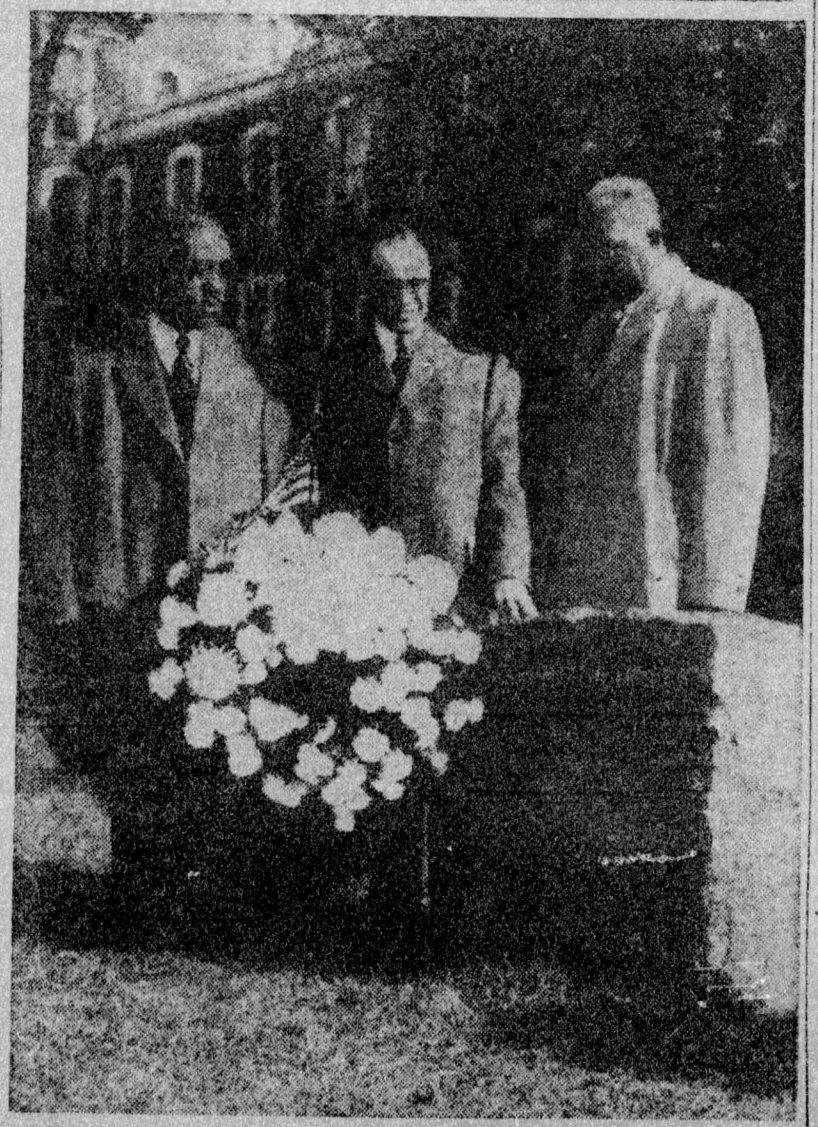
DURHAM — A man and a woman fought with an axe and a screwdriver as weapons here Sunday morning and police investigating the bloody affair called it a draw.
