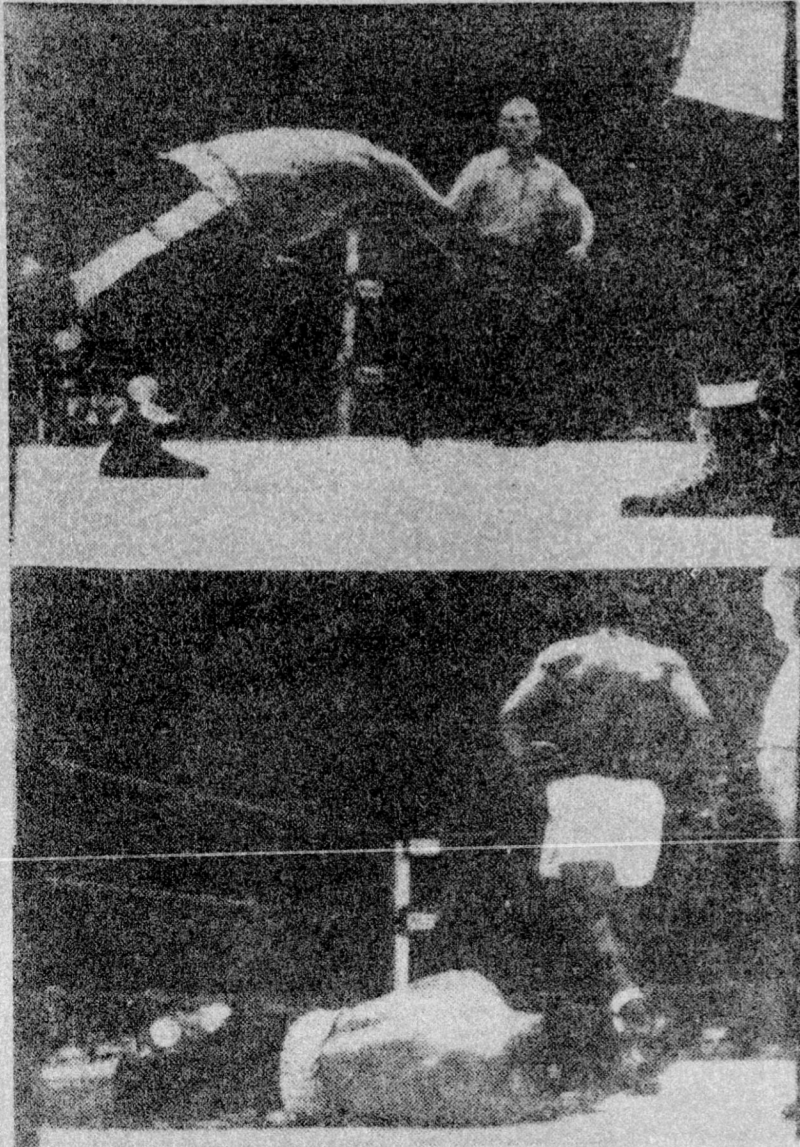

MIAMI—A dapper, goateed minister, who federal officials say sold "blessings" and winning numbers on Cuban lotteries, was charged Monday with mail fraud.

Postal inspectors estimated Bishop H. Hines, 39, of New York and Philadelphia, has raked between \$30,000 and \$40,000 a year from his gullible customers.

Hines has just completed a profitable tour down the eastern seaboard in his chauffeur-driven limousine, authorities said.

Hines sobbed openly when he appeared before U. S. Commissioner Roger Davis and pleaded tearfully on behalf of members of his Cosmopolitan Community Church in New York.

Davis ordered him held on \$10,000 bond.

"My sympathies are with people in religious work," Davis said. "But I can't see what religion is to do with the Cuban lottery."

Hines, who bills himself as the "World's Wonder Man and Psychological Consultant," was arrested Saturday as he was about to dispense his "blessings" to persons assembled in his hotel room.

Got Numbers From Bible

Postal inspectors said that his racket consisted of offering complete numbers as "blessings." These numbers are believed by many believers to be winning numbers in the Malta lottery.

Inspectors said he mailed invitations to people in the Miami area to come to his hotel room for "blessings."

The inspectors said Hines stated:

Insurance Fraud Counts Hold Five

WINSTON-SALEM — Four Winston-Salem residents and a Rock Hill, S. C. undertaker were bound over to Superior Court after a hearing here Saturday in an alleged Carolina's insurance scandal.

LISTED DOGS AS DEPENDENTS

JACKSONVILLE Fla. — Willie King, 49, was acquitted last week of committing tax fraud by listing his two dogs as dependents.

A federal court jury agreed with King's attorney that the man listed his dogs, "Willie King, Jr." and "Enon King" on his tax return in good faith and without fraudulent intent.

The prosecution had argued that King knew that he was doing wrong because he went to the trouble of changing the dogs' names from "Tojo" and "Spot". Prosecutors also pointed out that "Enon" is "none" spelled backwards.
