GOLDSBORO—Funeral services for two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Sampson, 76, and Maggie Cox, 32, who died as the result of a fire which gutted their home early New Year's Day, will be conducted from the First Baptist Church at 2 p.m. Friday, with Rev. M. W. Morgan in charge.

Blame Autos And Knives For 5 Deaths

RALEIGH — At least five persons met death by violence as the New Year's holiday weekend drew near a close and at least three others were injured, reports from throughout the state indicated on Tuesday.

One of the victims was killed when his car was struck by a passenger train, another died from injuries sustained when she was struck down by an automobile and a third died when the car in which she was a passenger overturned. Another was stabbed to death and still another died shortly after receiving treatment for knife wounds.

PREACHER, WIFE NABBED
KINSTON—Three deputy sheriffs arrested the Rev. Columbus Blount, 46, who "preaches anywhere I'm called," and his wife, Mrs. Ollie Lee Blount, 38, on charges of arson Monday. The husband is under a \$5,000 bond and the woman is under a bond of \$2,500. They reside at Kinston, Route 3. Officers reported that they were riding on patrol when they came upon a car that was on fire. They checked the license number and found that it had belonged to Lloyd Ray Dawson, who is alleged to have disposed of it in March. Blount reportedly later borrowed \$300 on the car, which was covered by fire insurance.

3 Men Stage Dance Hall Gun Battle

ROANOKE, Va.—A New Year's Eve dance broke up in panic here at 2 A.M. Tuesday when an exchange of gunfire killed two of the dancers and wounded a third. Detective Sgt. M. O. Cochran said and argument apparently broke out between Tony Bolesau, 35, David Johnson, 13 and Phillip Durham, 21. The argument exploded into a gunbattle which saw Bolesau and Johnson killed and Durham wounded. Cochran said Durham, who is now in a Roanoke hospital, has been charged with murder. LOCAL DRUGGIST FOUND INNOCENT

Dr. R. E. Wimberley, Sr., owner of the Central Drug Store, corner Davie and S. Swan Streets, who was arrested Sunday morning on charges of keeping his drug store open during the hours of 10 to 11 a.m., was found not guilty in City Court Monday morning. The druggist said that the officers who arrested him, both of whom were young, apparently did not realize that druggists may fill prescriptions at any time and that the city ordinance did not apply to drug stores.
