Assistant solicitor of Wake Superior Court, Robert B. Broughton, read a section of the law to the CAROLINIAN this week wherein it is believed to be a misdemeanor for an adult to leave minor children unattended in a house.

This statute may lead to the arrest and conviction of parents responsible for the deaths of eight colored children in this state during a three-day span last weekend.
