Noted Baptist Clergyman Opens 9th Service In NY

NEW YORK (ANP) — The Rev. Dr. Gardner C. Taylor of Brooklyn set the tone last Thursday at Madison Square Garden with his prayer opening the capacity 18,000-crowd at the ninth service of the Billy Graham crusade.

The Concord Baptist Church pastor prayed for more understanding and Christian love among all men. That noted evangelist in his sermon preached that men should let "the voice of God" enter their hearts.

Among the interested listeners was Gov. Orville Faubus of Arkansas who praised Dr. Graham. The Rev. Dr. Norman Vincent Peale of Marble Collegiate Church pronounced the benediction.

Ike Notes Progress Of Solons

WASHINGTON (ANP) — Congress is making the best effort it can to bring the civil rights bill and the school aid bill to the floor and get them passed, stated President Eisenhower this week.

This observation was made at his Wednesday news conference in reply to a reporter's question on whether he was satisfied with progress being made by Congress on his suggested legislation, particularly the civil rights and the school construction bills.

A part of the fighting spirit which Mr. Eisenhower exhibited in his radio-TV address on the previous night was apparently still with him during his press conference.

NO INTENTION OF GIVING UP
At several points he expressed determination to abide by the platform of his party on all issues and once emphasized that he had no intention of giving up the fight.

The "fight" declaration was made when reporter questioned the President on whether he planned to continue his budget fight or if the "case rests" after his two television talks.

Mr. Eisenhower replied that as long as he is in a fight the case never rests. He said he would never rest on his budget battle until this government is assured the necessary funds for operation.

When questioned on whether he would support those members of Congress who backed his legislative program, the President replied that he had no intention of punishing anyone. But he felt that every member of Congress should be slavishly inherent to his party's platform. He referred to the Republican platform of 1956 as a "political document" which he has no right or desire to desert.

KNOWLAND HAS STRONG CONVICTIONS

The President was asked his opinion of Senator Knowland's frequent disagreement with his program. He admitted that the Senate Minority Leader had differed with him on many critical points. But, added the President, that doesn't mean that Senator Knowland is his enemy. It only proves that the California Senator has strong convictions on the other side.
