

Nurse From North Carolina Concludes Outstanding Work In Lebanon; Returns

BEIRUT, Lebanon (ANP)—Miss Mary Lee Mills, Chief Nurse of the United States Operations Mission to Lebanon, who has the title of Lieutenant Colonel in the United States Public Health Service, returned to her work in Lebanon last week.

Miss Mills has been serving in Lebanon for five years and has done such an outstanding job in the development of the nursing school and nursing service here as well as serving as advisor to the Ministry of Health of Lebanon, that she has been awarded the Decoration of the Cedars by the government.

Deleate from North Carolina Miss Mills will stop by Rome, Italy on her way to the United States in order to attend the International Congress of Nurses which will be meeting there. She will serve as one of the delegates from the North Carolina Nurses Association, having been duly elected to represent it along with several caucasian nurses from the same state; 750 nurses from America will attend.

A graduate of New York University in nursing education and holding a master's degree from that institution, Mary Mills began her profession at Lincoln Hospital in Durham, N. C. She served with the Public Health Department of North Carolina before she joined the U. S. Public Health. While serving with that organization she was sent to Liberia.

There, with the rank of captain, she was a factor in the organization of the excellent nursing school functioning there. She spent five years in Liberia and was awarded a decoration in the Order of the Star of Africa, becoming the first public health nurse to be decorated by two foreign governments.

American Legion Leader Tells Negroes To "Expel Agitators Or Be Kicked Out"

JACKSON, Miss. (ANP) — A stern warning was received last week by Negro American Legion posts here when the state commander of the American Legion directed Negro posts to expel what he termed "agitators" or be kicked out of the organization.

The directive came from Jack Pace of Magee who said that radical Negro speakers had been invited to address Negro legion meetings and "stir up trouble." Pace made direct reference to Michigan Congressman Charles Diggs, who recently spoke in Mississippi.

The American Legion commander named no specific posts in his order, but cited incidents where a Negro legion post commander had allegedly denounced Mississippi's law enforcement agencies. Pace said "strong measures" would be taken to push racial "agitators" out of the legion organizations.
