Drs. R. P. Daniels, Wm. S. Nelson 'Finalists' At Fla. A&M University

TALLAHASSEE—Two hundred and sixty students of Florida A & M University received degrees here Monday morning, June 3, at a colorful 64th Commencement exercises held in Lee Hall Auditorium. This was the first class to spend four years since A & M became a university.

The commencement speaker Dr. Robert P. Daniel, president of Virginia State College, told the graduates—"The real student of creative energy and moral idealism will not be discouraged by the present medicines of untortured rule of thumb and unenlightened common opinion. He will go on to say—"As graduates, your achievement of wisdom lies in the solution of the paradox of ignorance in a land of increasing knowledge."

Dr. Daniel spoke to his audience on the theme "Paradoxes in Education," and outlined several paradoxes—"First, we believe in education but do not trust the education we receive. We go to school to get our ideas and expose ourselves to new opportunities as possible; third, we clamor for equality in education but are not willing to pay the cost or to be governed by equal standards; and fourth, educational achievement is measured in quantitative terms but appraised in qualitative terms."

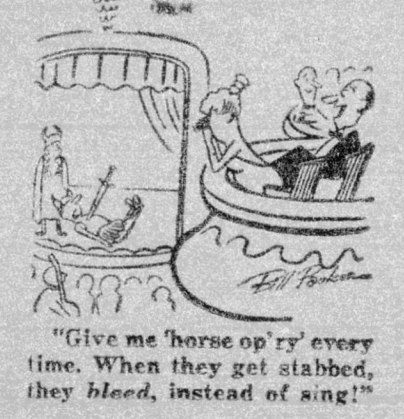
Post Rewards For Burners Of Crosses

COLUMBUS, O.—(AP)—Rev. John B. Quick, president, announced Thursday that the executive committee of the Columbus NAAACP has authorized the posting of a \$100.00 reward for information which results in the arrest and conviction of person or persons guilty in the Miller Avenue cross burnings at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Warren.

"In making the announcement, Rev. Quick said, "This kind of thing is terrible and has to be stopped quickly before it spreads all over our community. We have usually thought of cross burnings, window smashings, and other destruction of property as happening in the South, but right here in our own community a family where the man is 50 years old, is suffering these very things."
