

Dr. Johnson described this Mississippi farmer as a little man with patched blue jeans, young face, sparkling eyes. The farmer owned 125 acres of land which was well kept and fenced in. Ten per cent of this land was given to the church. Another portion he had given to his two sons and had helped them to build their own homes. This illiterate man also required his sons to dig their own wells. His wife was a partner in charge of the chickens, eggs, milk, and butter, which she could sell and use the money as she pleased.

This illiterate man bought the est two black mules in the state He kept his tools sharp, plowed leep, and sewed the best seeds. Then he waited for the rain and sun from God to do the rest. During his spare time the farmer went to his workshop and made useful equipment for the farm. He and his wife had done 42 crops togethor and "never fit"
