
**MANLY STREET CHRISTIAN**

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## Urban To Suburban Trend In Housing Hurts Negroes

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The Urban to suburban Long Island trek of New York City's population is stymied for the Negro by his economic inadequacy and by whites' "exclusiveness." Such were the opinions expressed by Charles Abrams, chairman of the State Commission Against Discrimination, and Mrs. Frances Levenson, executive director of the State Committee on Discrimination in Housing.

Speaking to the L. I. Housing Advisory Committee at Malby Catholic college in Rockville Center last Monday, Mr. Abrams said there has been an extraordinary amount of voluntary compliance in abolishing discrimination in FHA and VA-aided housing. However, there have been numerous complaints in private financed developments he stated.  
 Mr. Abrams said "low Negro income continues to be the principal barrier to competition by Negro families for new housing."  
 Mrs. Levenson expressed the opinion that a concept of exclusiveness by builders, which is bought by the public, has created "a log-jam in civil rights." She said homeowners automatically fear inroads into their "exclusive property."

## 69 Grads Finish At Knoxville

Knoxville, Tenn. — Sixty-nine graduates and over 1,500 other persons heard Dr. Mordecai Wyatt Johnson, president, Howard University, Washington, deliver an unusual Commencement address on the front campus lawn at Knoxville College, Monday, May 27, at 5 p.m. President James A. Colston presided.

The speaker's discourse was unusual for this occasion because of his recommendation, instead of recommending to them the life of a successful, formally educated man, he chose as an example the harmonious life of an illiterate, Mississippi farmer.  
 Dr. Johnson showed the grads that successful living was not assured by the degree alone but that a man who had only the wisdom of God could enjoy a more contented, purposeful, and prosperous life.  
 Analyzing the farmer's life, Dr. Johnson challenged these graduates to buy the best equipment, keep their tools sharp, plow deep and sow the best seed, make their mates partners, make children earn their own and be faithful servants of God.

Dr. A. K. Stewart, General Secretary, Board of American Missions, United Presbyterian Church, North America, gave the invocation. Rev. Frank Gordon, pastor of Shiloh Presbyterian Church of Knoxville, presided. Dr. William C. Latta, president Board of American Missions, benediction. Dr. Lee L. Campbell, presentation of candidates for degrees; music by college choir, directed by Dr. Newell C. Fitzpatrick.

Dr. Johnson described this Mississippi farmer as a little man with patched blue jeans, young face, sparkling eyes. The farmer owned 125 acres of land which was well kept and fenced in. Ten per cent of this land was given to the church. Another portion he had given to his two sons and had helped them to build their own homes. This illiterate man also required his sons to dig their own wells. His wife was a partner in charge of the chickens, eggs, milk, and butter, which she could sell and use the money as she pleased.  
 This illiterate man bought the best two black mules in the state. He kept his tools sharp, plowed deep, and sowed the best seeds. Then he waited for the rain and sun from God to do the rest. During his spare time the farmer went to his workshop and made useful equipment for the farm. He and his wife had done 42 crops together and "never fit."

Grower prices for soybeans will probably continue around present levels for the remainder of the year.

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
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
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
