Grid Cards Pin Title Hopes On Ollie Matson

(Editor's Note: This is the first story on Pro Football teams with Negro players.)

CHICAGO (AP)—When you think of the Chicago Cardinals and the team's chances of becoming a National Football League title, you think of Ollie Matson.

Matson is clearly established as one of football's best performers. His great running almost carried the Cardinals to an eastern division title a year ago. He was deprived of winning the National League rushing title in 1956 because of some questionable clipping penalties called against his teammates.

The former University of San

Francisco star is the most feared runner in the NFL. He also is a dangerous pass receiver.

He is just one of several tan players who brighten the hopes of the Cards. Veterans include Jimmie Still, defensive specialist; Dick "Mafia" Traine; Lane, another defensive star; Waddie Lewis, a fine all-around performer; and Dave Manz, the Cards' best kicker and a fine runner.

Lane was forced from retirement for another season with the Cardinals. Several years ago, as a NFL freshman, Dick set a league record for pass interception while playing for the Los Angeles Rams.

First Conference Victory:

Aggies Get 13-0 Win Over Virginia Union

GREENSBORO — The A and T College Aggies coupled a fine running attack with its now well-established defense to upset Virginian University of Richmond, 13-0, in a conference football game played here Saturday afternoon at Memorial Stadium.

Arthur Worthy, star halfback for the Aggies from Gastonia, ripped off long runs, was uncanny in pass reception and did a yeoman job on defense to lead the Aggies to their first conference victory of the young season.

He scored both touchdowns, one with a 30-yard pass from Otto Ferry, substitute quarter back and the second on the end of a 15-yard scamper.

Only the stubborn defense of the Virginians kept the score down. The fine line play of end John Martin and Frank Puckett, guard, was a big help for Union. The visitors stopped other Aggie ground thrusts on the 3, 14 and 22-yard lines.

The Aggies scored first early in the fourth quarter.

Hampton Edges Delaware State College's Hornets

HAMPTON, Va.—Underdog Hampton Institute's Fighting Pirates, upset the Delaware State College Hornets' 1956 CIAA co-champions, with a decisive 6-0 victory before a sold-out, wind-swept crowd Saturday afternoon at the Hampton college stadium.

Ike Brown, the Pirates' shifty right half-back scored the winning touchdown in the third quarter. The sophomore from Roanoke, Virginia, lunged a lateral from Al Jackson, left half, on the 10-yard line and lugged it across into scoring territory dragging several Hornet tacklers with him. George Brown, team captain, missed the conversion attempt.

What looked like another game developed that same period. Captain Brown interrupted a Delaware pass on the 35-yard line and ran to the Hornets' 25-yard line. On a 12-yard drive over left tackle William Dudley, full back from Fredericksburg, Virginia, made the first down. The Delaware line tightened, however, and stopped the drive on their 5-yard line.

In the first two quarters play was even, the ball see-sawed back and forth and there was little passing.



Head Coach Gus Gaines Honored Upon Leaving Fayetteville State

FAYETTEVILLE — In recognition of Coach Gus Gaines' twelve years of service as head coach and chairman of the area of health and physical education at the Fayetteville State Teachers College, and of his wife, Landonia S. Gaines' eleven-year tenure as secretary to the president and currently assistant budget officer, the faculty and staff presented the pair a gift and handed a check for the two Gaines' daughters, Linda, 7, and Deborah, 3.

The presentations were made at a recent assembly period by Dr. Lafayette Parker, recently appointed Acting Dean of the

College. Orlando Hudson, President of the General Alumni Association, made a presentation for the alumni group.

In his remarks of appreciation, Coach Gaines was strong in his thanks for the cooperation from faculty and students that has been his at Fayetteville. He also remarked the "fight" even against odds that has always characterized Bronco outfit. "I have always been proud of the Bronco boys," he concluded.

"Big Gus," as he has been popularly known around the CIAA circuit, leaves a strong record as

a coach of the Fayetteville institution. Over his twelve-year period, his teams have rolled up in football 56 wins against 47 losses and 6 ties; and in basketball, 310 wins to 109 losses. It was he who spearheaded the school's entry in the CIAA back in 1933. Last year his boys came up with third place in the loop basketball tournament.

Gaines resigned his post at Fayetteville to accept a position as Director of Programs at the New York Training School for Boys at Warwick, New York.
