

Shaw Bears Spoil St. Aug.'s Opener With 19-0 Win

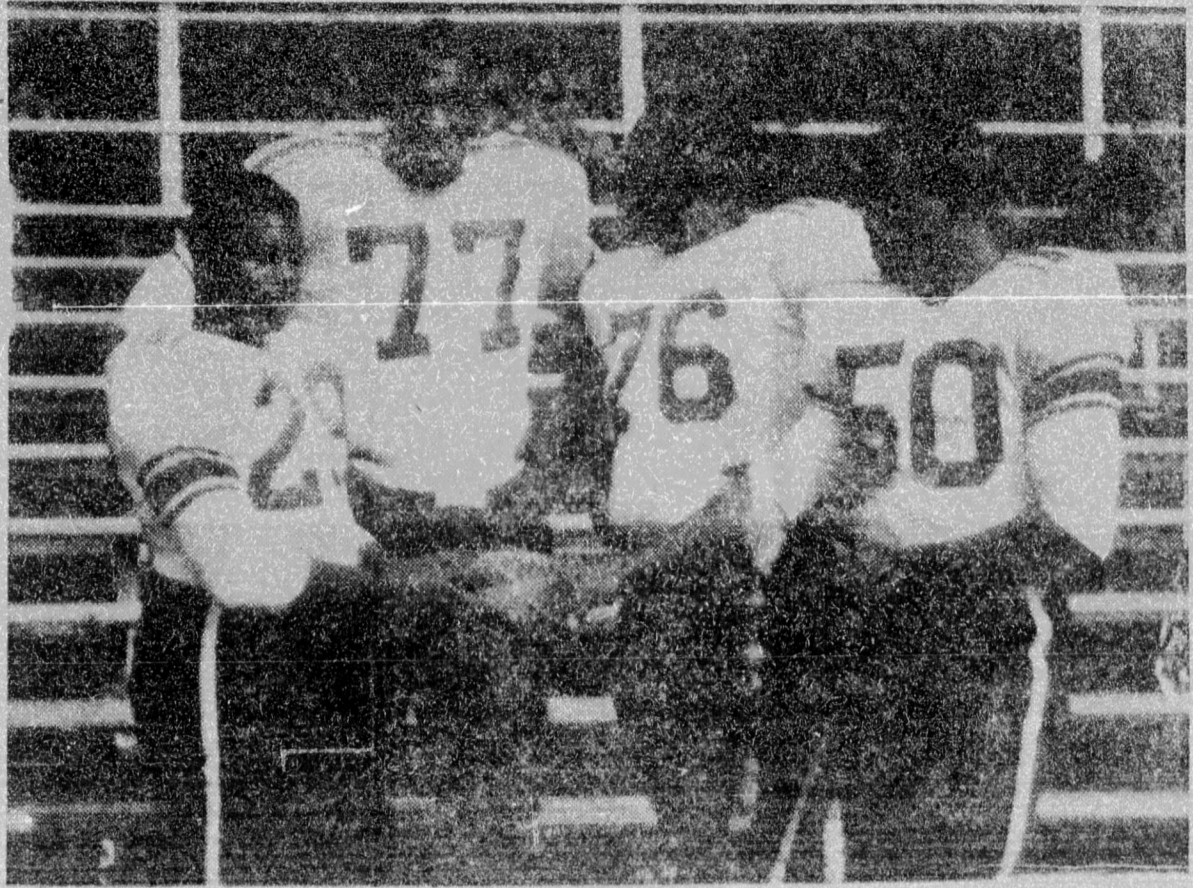
Grid Cards Pin Title Hopes On Ollie Matson

CHICAGO (AP) — When you think of the Chicago Cardinals and the team's chances of becoming a National Football League title, you think of Ollie Matson.

Matson is clearly established as one of football's best performers. His great running almost carried the Cardinals to an eastern division title a year ago. He was deprived of winning the National League rushing title in 1956 because of some questionable clipping penalties called against his teammates.

First Conference Victory: Aggies Get 13-0 Win Over Virginia Union

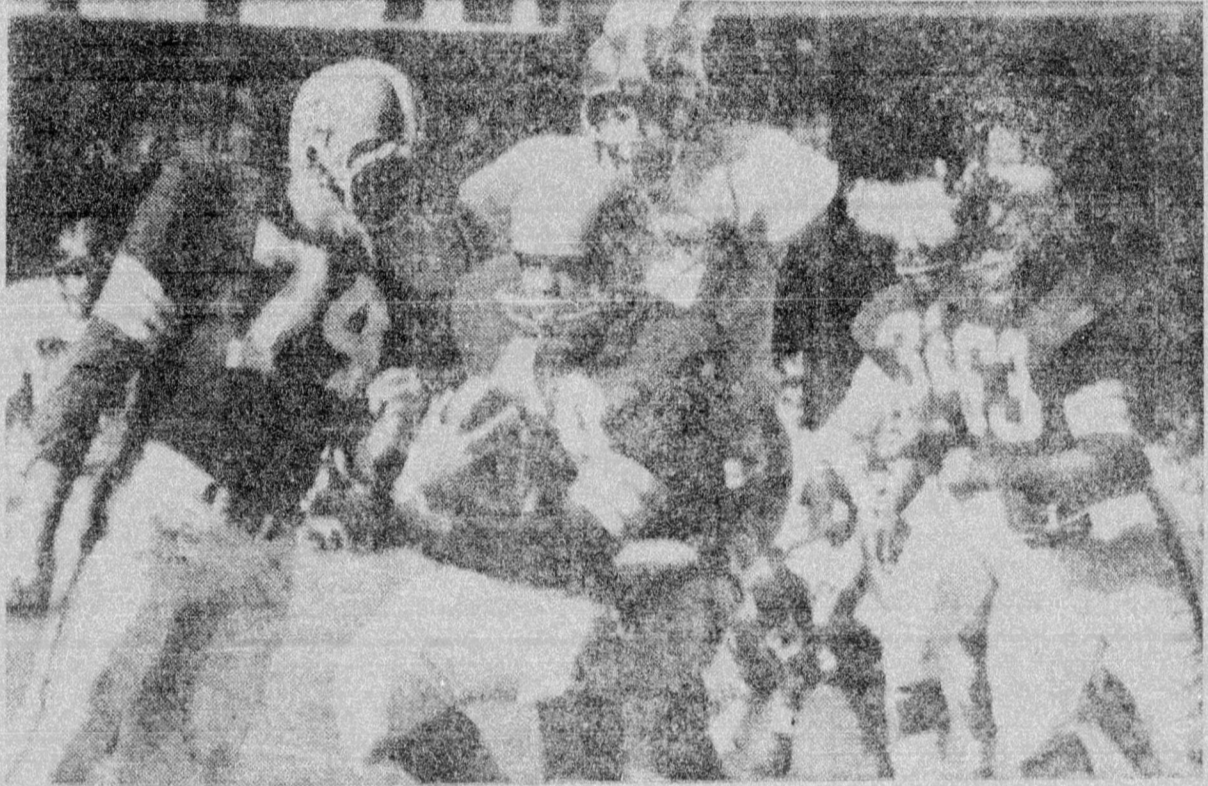
GREENSBORO — The A and T College Aggies coupled a fine rushing attack with its new well-established defense to upset Virginia Union University of Richmond, 13-0 in a conference football game played here Saturday afternoon at Memorial Stadium.

Arthur Worley, star halfback for the Aggies from Gastonia, slipped off line runs and an early job on defense to lead the Aggies to their first conference victory of the young season.

He scored both touchdowns, one with a 50-yard pass from Ollie Perry, substitute quarterback and the second on the end of a 15-yard scamper.

Only the stubborn defense of the Virginia kept the score down. The line held steady and John Mack and Frank Pritchard, guards, was a big help for Union. The V's stopped either Aggie scoring threats on the 3, 14 and 20-yard lines.

Hampton Edges Delaware State College's Hornets

HAMPTON, Va. — Unsettling Hampton Institute's Fighting Pirates upset the Delaware State College Hornets' 1956 CIAA co-champions, with a decisive 6-0 victory before a chilled, wind-blown crowd Saturday afternoon at the Hampton college stadium.

The Brown, the Pirates' shift-right half-back scored the winning touchdown in the third quarter. The sophomore from Roanoke, Virginia, barged a lateral from Al Jackson, left half, on the 10 yard line and lugged it across into scoring territory dragging several Hornet tacklers with him. George Brown, team captain, missed the conversion attempt.

What looked like another game developed that same period. Captain Brown intercepted a Delaware pass on the 35 yard line and ran to the Hornets' 25 yard line. On a 12 yard drive over left tackle William Dudley, full back Tom Fredericksburg, Virginia, made the first down. The Delaware line tightened, however, and stopped the drive on their 5 yard line.

The Shaw University Bears spoiled the Saint Augustine's College Falcons' season opener, Saturday afternoon to the tune of 19-0. In the twentieth meeting between the cross-town rivals, the Shaw Bears have won sixteen of these meetings.

With the fast charging line-men and superior backs, the Bears gained 316 yards rushing while the Falcons in only 17 yards rushing. Shaw made thirteen first downs to only four for Saint Augustine's.

The Bears' ground attack reeled off yardage time and time again with junior halfback Eugene Hammonds of Asheville gaining 127 yards and senior fullback Leverage Hunter gaining 41 yards.

Behind the excellent ball handling of senior quarterback Lewis Garvin the Bears scored their first

touchdown late in the first quarter as Hunter carried over from the one-yard line on a Saint Augustine's penalty of fifteen yards for holding. The extra point was attempted by Garvin and missed.

During the second quarter the Bears and Falcons played mainly from Shaw's 20 to the Falcons' 15 yards with neither team scoring. Shaw led at halftime, 6-0. In the third quarter the Bears took to the air to score their second touchdown.

Quarterback Lewis Garvin passed to senior right end Julius Cromwell from the four yard line to annex the Bears' score. Again Garvin's attempt was wide and Shaw led 12-0. Saint Augustine's moved the ball within the fifteen yard Shaw line but lost on downs.

Eagles Swamp Morgan, 27-7

DURHAM — Behind the powerful and versatile play of its big 223 lb average per man line, North Carolina College, featuring Clinton E. Jackson's 103 yard touchdown sprint, defeated Morgan State 27 to 7 at Durham Athletic Park Saturday night, Oct. 6.

Jackson's second period dash followed his interception of back Jack Dennis' pass intended for flankman Jim Buxton in the end zone.
